## *Notes from the Manse*

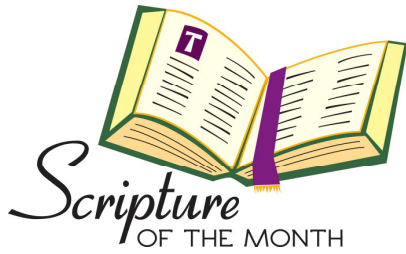
*“You will grieve, but your grief will turn to joy....Now is your time of grief, but I will see you again and you will rejoice, and no one will take away your joy.”*  
*John 16:20, 22 (NIV)*

When Jesus spoke these words to his disciples, he was trying to prepare them, to comfort them in advance for the time soon to come when he would leave them to go to the one he called Father. But they are words that speak across the centuries to all who would call themselves disciples. In, oh, so many ways, we too are in a time of grief. We grieve for the people of Japan; we grieve for all those throughout this country who suffer because of strange and frightening storms. We grieve for the poor, for those who are scarred by war. We grieve for Christian denominations, including our own, that are sadly split apart as people forget how to live and love within disagreement and are thereby distracted from the Lord's call to care for the least. And, here at Leacock, we grieve for the loss of two beloved children of God, Clara Petit de Mange and Janice Homsher.

However, let us not forget the rest of Jesus' words. Grief does not have the final say, for through Christ, life was forever shown to be stronger than death, death in all its many forms, be they physical or mental or spiritual. My heart aches whenever I see the deep loss in the eyes of family members who have had to say goodbye to a loved one. But in the time I have spent with Clara and Janice's family, I have seen that healing has already begun, even if in small, tentative ways. It has begun as memories are shared, for it becomes so apparent how full were the lives of these two women. There has been laughter, as some of those precious, crazy moments of a lifetime are recalled. And there has been inspiration, for both Clara and Janice were guided always by a will to give and to serve. They would want us to trust the promises of the Lord. They would want us to deny death its claim, and instead embrace life, as they did.

And you know, within this congregation, there is so much that should make us want to cast aside grief and instead rejoice. In a few days, we will have another of our Community Meals. At the last one, over 60 people broke bread with us, as this opportunity for fellowship, this opportunity to serve, continues to grow. Our Hymn Sings have begun, and how great it is to hear worship in song fill Old Leacock. The youth are getting their new rooms fitted out. Vacation Bible School is being put together under the wonderful leadership of Loretta McClarigan. And on Pentecost, we will welcome several new members. Many people work hard to make all this happen. But let us not forget that ultimately it is the Lord who brings blessing. In all these markers of life here at Leacock we do indeed see the Lord. If we trust in that Lord, if we allow ourselves to be led, not by our so often broken human impulses, but rather by the Spirit of God, no one, nothing, will be able to take away the life and joy we share. And you know, if we do, I'll just bet Clara and Janice will be pleased.

**TITLE:** Trendsetting Tightwads: More-with-Less Life When Thrift is 'In' – Valerie Weaver-Zercher

**DESCRIPTION:** Thirty years ago, Doris Janzen Longacre, author of the *More with Less Cookbook*, wrote another book, called *Living More with Less*, about living simply out of concern for the global poor and the health of the planet. Long before *Real Simple* magazine existed, and before Cindy Crawford had her “eco-awakening,” Doris and the contributors to her book were outlining the ways that they were finding to live frugally and responsibly. So is the pop-culture version of “frugality” in 2010 the same thing as “living more with less”? What might three-decades-old writing from a few Mennonites have to contribute to the contemporary conversation about sustainability, and thrift, and overconsumption? What’s a Christian tightwad to do when her coun-

tercultural values move dead-center?

**BIO:** Valerie Weaver-Zercher is a contributing editor to *Sojourners* and editor of the 30th-anniversary edition of *Living More with Less* (Herald Press, 2010). Her writing has appeared in the *Los Angeles Times*, *Chicago Tribune*, *Orion*, *The Christian Century*, *Christianity Today*, *Mothering*, *Publishers Weekly*, *The Mennonite*, and other publications. Valerie does writing and editing from her home in Mechanicsburg, Pa., and she and her husband and three sons attend Slate Hill Mennonite Church.

## LEACOCK PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN'S ORGANIZATION (LPWO)

First of all, I want to make sure I begin this article by telling all the women of the church that we have not yet set anything in stone (not even the name you see above). This article is to keep you informed of what we've been doing since the all-woman gathering we had earlier this year and to ask for your input.

A small committee of women has met three times since that first large gathering, hoping to focus on what the women of Leacock said they needed and wanted and to figure out ways to implement these needs and wants.

As of the writing of this article, our next meeting will be held over lunch at Four Brothers restaurant right after the second service on Sunday June 5, and we have invited all women of the church to join yet again.

One of the decisions we have made is to rewrite the bylaws, as many of us felt that they are both outdated and redundant. PW was first founded back when the women of Leacock didn't serve on Session (yes, that was a long time ago, wasn't it?) and before we had the committees we have today that take care of much of the business originally handled by PW.

It makes sense to update the bylaws to reflect the church today. To that effect, we've chosen first to come up with a vision statement. The new bylaws will stem from this statement to support the goals of our vision.

This is the vision statement we approved to be shared with the other women of the church for input, acknowledging that we do not specifically point to mission, but that the goal of mission (noted by both focus groups at the all-woman meeting) is implied:

*The Leacock Presbyterian Women's Organization (LPWO) envisions itself as a warm, welcoming place for women of all ages who are associated with Leacock Presbyterian Church. This community focuses on the needs and desires of twenty-first century women, providing a respite in our busy lives.*

*LPWO's main goals are to support each other in a nonjudgmental environment of acceptance and safety so that, together, we can explore our faith, achieving a deeper understanding of that faith*

*through fellowship, fun, and engaging activities. We are a group open to new pathways in our faith journeys, and we share our talents with each other, with the entire congregation of the church, and with the community at large.*

*Our hope is that all who walk our pathways with us will be touched by the love and acceptance we exhibit as taught to us by Jesus Christ.*

We have also been exploring some activities/organizations that might interest the women at Leacock:

- Supporting Beth Shalom House of Peace. This is an organization that helps women re-enter society after release from prison. Some challenges these women face are difficulty getting their driver's license, getting to their probation officer without a driver's license, staying away from the people involved in crime.
- Going on "fun fieldtrips" such as hiking, rafting, visiting Philadelphia, and weekend retreats.
- Including "pampering" in some retreats ." Suggestions of where to hold a retreat included the Pendle Hill Retreat Center in Philadelphia, or Mariawald Retreat Center in Reading.
- Sharing talents in a way such

as teaching interested women how to bake, quilt, etc.

- Holding a short Bible study/ devotional one Sunday a month during the Sunday School hour. This could be followed by an activity that helps us either get to know each other better, or just provides some socialization. We could encourage the men to do something the same hour, so that men that come to church with the women have something to do.
- Having a women's lunch out a few times a year (similar to our June 5 lunch).
- Selling soup, etc. on Sundays to help finance our activities.
- Conducting a service of worship, similar to such services we've conducted in the past.
- Having a family night to kick-off the Sunday School year in early September, then having a lock-in for the youth the same night.

We would like to get your input on these ideas, and give you the opportunity to come up with your own ideas. Stay tuned for a survey in the newsletter, bulletin, and in the Narthex where you can share this input.

We are also considering having another meeting in September similar to the one we had early this

year in which all the women are invited to come. The objective may be to elect a board whose responsibility would be to organize, or enlist people to organize, the events we choose for the coming year.

## THE CHANGE IN LANGUAGE IN THE PC (U.S.A.)'S ORDINATION STANDARDS

Recently, Amendment 10a to our denomination's constitution received the votes needed to pass. There has been considerable confusion about what this amendment means for the denomination, Donegal Presbytery, and Leacock. On June 5, between services, we will have a gathering where the amendment will be explained and questions answered. Below you will find the current language and the language of 10a. If you have any questions or concerns, in the meantime, please contact Rev. Birch. It is far better to discuss these matters than to allow rumors to mislead and divide.

The current text of G-6.0106b reads:

*Those who are called to office in the church are to lead a life of obedience to Scripture and in conformity to the historic confessional standards of the church. Among these standards is the requirement to live either in fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman (W-4.9001), or chastity in singleness. Persons refusing to repent of any self-acknowledged practice which the confessions call sin shall not be ordained and/or installed as deacons, elders, or ministers of the Word and Sacrament.*

Amendment 10a reads:

*Standards for ordained service reflect the church's desire to submit joyfully to the Lordship of Christ in all aspects of life (G-1.0000). The governing body responsible for ordination and/or installation (G-14.0240; 14.0450) shall examine each candidate's calling, gifts, preparation, and suitability for the responsibilities of office. The examination shall include, but not be limited to, a determination of the candidate's ability and commitment to fulfill all requirements as expressed in the constitutional questions for ordination and installation (W-4.4003). Governing bodies shall be guided by Scripture and the confessions in applying standards to individual candidates.*

Overall, there are good reasons to be pleased with this month's financial figures. Giving continues to be up compared with a year ago. And though we are one-third of the way through the year, we are below one third in the percentage of the budget spent. It is true that expenses thus far have exceeded the offering by \$5,387. However, this does not reflect other sources of income, which, when added, mean that we continue to operate in the black. Expenses earlier in the year were a bit higher than perhaps expected, but those for this month were down considerably from a year ago. So, we need to continue to be attentive to our expenses going forward. But the church remains in sound financial health.

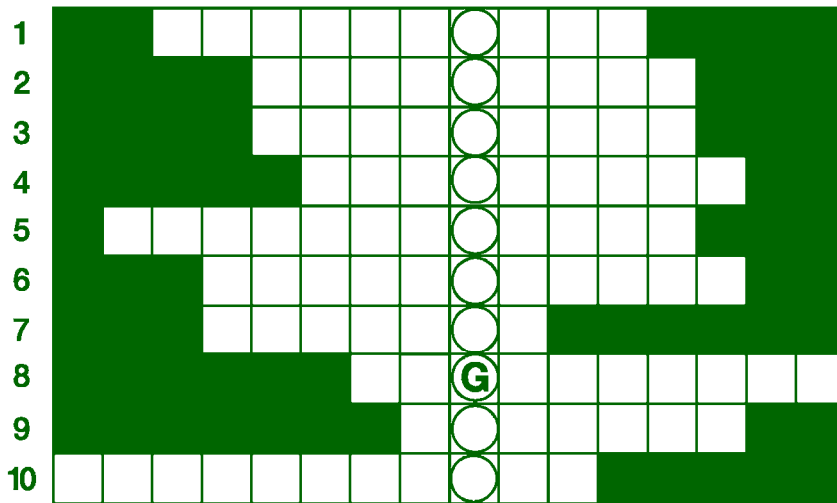

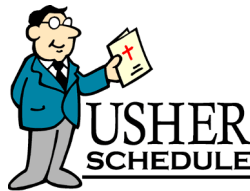
