GATHERING

Call to Worship and Lighting the Advent Candles

Leader: Stop. Listen. Pay attention. Love is coming near.

People: We wait in the love of the coming Messiah that transforms us.

Leader: Sometimes, angels surprise us as they did Mary with good news too fantastic to believe and yet too real to ignore.

People: The Hope Bringer, Peace Maker, Joy Sustainer grows in a womb, preparing to be born among us. So we wait.

Leader: We listen faithfully for the day that all the earth awaits.

People: With Mary, we long for the coming of the Child who will transform the world, bringing justice where injustice reigns, fullness where hunger persists, and favor to the ones the world calls lowly.

Leader: So let us join our voices and our lives in magnifying God, our Savior!

People: We come to wait and to declare the coming of the Love that transforms us! AMEN

*Prayer of the Day and Confession (*Inspired by Luke 1:46-55*)

Leader: Every notion we have about power, success, wealth, and achievement, God takes and tosses out the window. More importantly, God comes to us to upset our notion that we have to save ourselves, that we can save ourselves. In Jesus, God comes to us, removing our sin, our failures, our expectations, so we might have new life. (*Please join me as we pray, saying,*)

Advent God, we confess we are not always the people You hope us to be. We too often ignore or judge the very ones You favor. Too often we admire and emulate those in positions of power and influence where You choose the weak and helpless. We are so

focused on having more and more that we risk becoming empty in what we imagine is our fullness. Forgive us, Mighty God, and look upon us with compassion. If we take tidings of comfort and joy seriously, we will offer peace and good will wherever we go. If as shepherds who left their fields, we will leave behind familiar responsibilities to discover new ways you come to our world. If we would be like the Magi, we would set out from familiar territory seeking extraordinary ways to honor you.

(Silence is kept, then we pray:)

Even now—yes, even in this very moment, God we pray, come to us, bring hope, bring joy, bring peace as only You can give it. If we can, we will live secure in the gifts You freely offer. We accept anew the gift of Your love, serving Jesus the Christ, Emmanuel, God with us, in whose name we pray. AMEN
