Notes from the Manse

"By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control."—Galatians 5:22

Several years ago, I was asked to participate in a worship service on Trinity Sunday. There were three of us—I was the only one not a minister—and the idea was that each would speak on one person of the triune God. Now, I guess I'll never know how the assignments were divvied up, but somehow, mysteriously, I was given the Holy Spirit. The others seemed quite content speaking about the Father and the Son. But the Holy Spirit? Come on! I mean after all, we are talking about a Spirit here, something or someone a bit different from our usual experience within a mortal, physical world. I knew fathers and people who had acted as parents to me; I knew sons—I was one. But a Spirit? The whole thing made me a bit nervous. And I've found I'm not the only one. Apparently there are many folks, including ministers, who don't feel all that comfortable or confident speaking about this third member of the Trinity. But this is the thing—something happened that time long ago. Suddenly, seemingly from nowhere, I knew what I should say. You see, I believe the Spirit came to me, and things turned out OK.

Since then, I have come to believe that, far from being the most mysterious, most remote, person of the Trinity, in many ways the Spirit is the closest, the most accessible. Scripture tells us that the Holy Spirit is many things, and many of them touch us very personally. It is the Spirit who creates us, not only in our birth, but over and over again as we grow and become new, as we are reborn. And it is the Spirit who comforts us, when we lie alone at night in a hospital bed, when we face a decision that will change the course of our lives. But Scripture is very clear that the Spirit, like all of faith, like salvation, is never only a personal thing. No, Jesus and later Paul make it clear that we were not intended to live alone, but rather to be in relation; it is in fellowship that we find Christ and that the Spirit works most powerfully. Many people claim to be filled with the Spirit, to be alive with faith. But there is a way to know if the Spirit is really present. Notice the quote above from *Galatians*. The "By contrast" refers to what Paul calls the works of the flesh. Some of these involve intemperance in all its forms; another is idolatry, in all its forms; but most involve things that tear apart relation, enmity, fighting, jealousy, anger, arguments, dissensions, factions. If any of this is present in our life together, then do not look for the Spirit. There is only a human, broken spirit present.

Ah, but then comes the fruit of the Spirit, what comes when God and not our fearful, hurting hearts leads. Look at that list above: it is all about being with others, across and beyond difference and hurt and our own, oh so sure, opinions about the way things should be done. This Sunday was Pentecost. Do we dare to let the Spirit into our lives; do we dare to become something so different than the usual, human way? Will we be led the way of the cross, the way of Christ? If we do, we will be patient with and faithful to each other; we will be kind and gentle and generous; we won't impose our will, our ideas on others. We will love; above all, we will love. And then, oh, yes, we will find peace; we will be filled with joy.




STEWARDSHIP REPORT - FINANCIAL UPDATE APRIL 2012

Not only is our offering this month wonderfully strong, we also kept our expenditures well within budget. Our total percent of budget expended is 27.8% or \$68,716 versus 33% or \$82,452 IF the entire budgeted amount had been spent. We are just ahead of expenses thus far in 2012, and that is a blessing. The summer is just around the corner and in years past this is the time many families go on vacation and travel. Attendance is lower and commensurately, so is the offerings. **Please give consideration to this when planning your giving over the summer months.**

In addition to the extremely generous giving for our operating budget, April also displayed that our congregation values the special funds and projects. \$4,334 was given to special funds!! The breakdown of this is \$3,130 for the Organ Fund, \$455 for Trustee projects, \$100 to the music program, \$500 to the emergency fund and \$149 given during the Easter morning breakfast. Thanks to all who gave to these special funds and programs; this is just awe-some. We will still be working on raising funds for the organ in coming months to pay off loans. The Organ Committee is committed to driving to \$60,000 and beyond, as soon as possible! I'm sure we will see some great fund-raising events this summer. I was very happy to hear the organ back in action last Sunday. It sounded incredible (I'm sure Dianne had a little to do with that as well). Really looking forward to the final work to be completed!

The Stewardship Committee thanks everyone for all donations small and large, not only of money, but of time and talent as well.

Matters of Faith—Questions for a Pastor

It's time for the fifth question in our series. Again, I am following the list given me in order. This month's question is, "Why <u>two</u> lit candles in front of the pulpit, to represent the Holy Spirit?"

Light, in some form, has long figured into our faith tradition, stretching back to the earliest history of the Jewish ancestors of Jesus. For instance, in the law given Moses, mention of the lamps that are be kept lit in the temple. And in *1 Samuel*, the prophet receives his call while sleeping next to the lamp that was burning through the night in the temple. When the early Christian writers sought for ways to convey all that the coming of Christ meant, they turned to the image of light entering a dark, confused world—all you need do is look at the prologue to *John* to see Jesus described as light shining in a darkness that cannot overcome it.

The early Christians adopted many elements of Jewish worship. At first, people simply gathered in homes to share a meal, to celebrate the Lord's Supper, to pray, sing songs, and reflect on Scripture. When churches began to become more formal, they often included an altar, in echoes of Jewish tradition. And in time, a custom arose to have two candles on the altar, placed to either side of a cross. There were very specific rules about the candles: they were to be made of beeswax and had to remain lit throughout the Mass. If, by chance, one or both were blown out, they had to be relit within fifteen minutes or otherwise the Mass would have to be begun again. The wax of the candles was thought to represent Jesus' body, the wick his spirit, and the flame his divinity. Though there have been some changes over the years, all of this remains essentially the practice of Roman Catholicism to this day.

The Eastern Orthodox churches retained this custom, even after the break with Rome. And, interestingly, the custom was retained by many of the churches that grew out of the Reformation. Lutherans, Methodists, and Anglicans all employed two candles, which were again to be made of beeswax. The symbolism, however, did begin to change: Lutherans, for instance, identified one as the Epistle candle and the other as the Gospel candle, with the former lit first and extinguished last.

The Reformed churches, which include the Presbyterians, took a very different tack. There was a strong impetus to get rid of all ornamentation, which, it was believed, could lead to idolatry. Therefore, there was no altar, instead only a communion table that was not to be raised, but rather on the level of the people, since God was in the midst of the people in the Sacrament. And for a long time, nothing but the elements of the Lord's Supper was to be on the table. Times change, and many Presbyterian churches did begin to place things on the communion table. Some now have Peace candles, others a candle to represent Christ as the Light of the world. And there are others, like Leacock, where things have come full circle, for on the table is a cross surrounded by two candles. What those candles symbolize varies from church to church, with some, indeed, seeing the Holy Spirit represented by the shining flame. But in the end, it all comes down to the same thing: in a sad, often dark world, God in Christ is a light that will endure.



CARING FAMILIES -WHO'S YOUR NEIGHBOR?

We all lead extremely busy lives here at Leacock, and often, it seems difficult to find the time to get to know each other better, or to spend as much time with each other on Sunday mornings before and after church as we might like.

Sometimes, we can be so busy that we lose track of our own members. We'd like to bring some of that old-fashioned feel of time back to the Leacock community, time for visiting and enjoying each others' company as well as taking care of each other and helping each other out when needed.

It would be nice to know that there is always a group of people close by to depend on when, for instance, you'd like some company for a doctor's appointment, or need a ride to church, or are too sick to go out and need someone to pick up some medicine for you, or maybe your family is away, and you just want to go out and enjoy brunch with someone after church.

We're working on putting together

small groups of Leacock caring families who can be there for each other, and we're hoping this will be a way to strengthen old friendships while forging new ones.

During May and June, we will be mapping the families at Leacock so we can see who lives where and start forming these caring families by geographic proximity.

On May 1, a large map will be posted on the bulletin board in the hall behind the Sunday school classrooms (across from the women's room). You will note that it has been divided into sections by color. Please locate your address on the map and which color is associated with your address. Stick an appropriately colored pin to mark your home and then print your name and address on the appropriate colored address sheet on the table below the bulletin board. (Directions will be provided.)

We will be grouping families according to neighborhoods. Later this fall, we will have a "kick-off" potluck dinner so that families can get to know each other, and we will explain in detail the nature of these caring families.
