Notes from the Manse

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."—1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

There are problems out there. We all know that. It's a broken world and there's a world of problems. You can't pick up a paper or turn on the television without hearing about just another killing, another bombing, another case of abuse, another people stealing peace from those without power, without a voice. But you don't have to look that far, do you? There's hurt in our families, anger and illness and so much worry. Kids go to school afraid of being bullied. Not even churches or the denominations to which they belong are spared of problems. And sometimes it can all seem overwhelming. Where to begin? And how can one person's efforts make any real difference? Well, Paul, in the passage above, gives a good place to start—pray, pray without ceasing. Turn to God, put our problems in God's hands, give up the exhausting burden of thinking it's all up to us alone. Pray for healing, our own and those who have hurt us. And when we listen for the word of God, when we allow ourselves to be led, not by our own desires or opinions but rather by the will of God, why, then our efforts, no matter how small, can make a difference. They are the bricks that can build the Kingdom.

But that isn't all that Paul had to say. He urged us to give thanks in all circumstances, not just when things are going as we would like, but also when times are tough, for, you know, God is at work even then. And over the last few weeks I have been reminded by how much we have to be thankful for here at Leacock. Session members take the time, even at the end of a long day, thoughtfully to consider important matters for the church. Session committees work with dedication to bring life to Leacock's programs. Trustees are vigilant in caring for the physical plant of the church and the finances that support it. Deacons serve and care and love.

And then there was the parade for Paradise's tri-centennial. Take the time to look at the pictures in the Narthex—it did indeed take a congregation to build a float. So many people planned and built and towed to make the short trip to Paradise Park possible. And I heard more than one person say that it was the best float in the parade that day. Or what about our organ project? Even in such a difficult economy, Leacock raised over \$60,000. Now, the organ is repaired. And how glorious it sounds! Then, this last weekend we raised money for the organ at the Balloon Fest, with so many folks contributing baked goods or setting up the booth or staffing it. And always there is so much work done behind the scenes, setting up tables, taking them down, creating special bulletins, or putting together newsletters. So, oh, yes, let us give thanks.

But there's still more. We celebrated the repair of the organ with a wonderful concert and an extravagant reception afterwards. And that was right to do. For we should rejoice here at Leacock. We should celebrate all that is good and wonderful here in our midst, all the people who serve with love. Yes, there are problems. But let us listen to Paul. Let us rejoice, let us pray, let us give thanks, for that is what God in Christ wants.

SEPTEMBER SESSION SNIPPETS

With the General Assembly's adoption of the New Form of Government and the concurrence of Donegal Presbytery, Session committees have been charged with writing a Manual of Operations detailing in depth their working responsibilities and procedures followed for all facets of congregational life. We ended August with our total year to date offering \$5,039 behind year to date expenses for 2012, despite control of spending. 53.8% of the budget has been spent through the end of August versus 59% this time last year. Although a five thousand dollar deficit is not ideal, we actually gave more and spent far less in August of this year compared to August 2011. And let us not forget the other blessings and gifts given by our congregation and friends of Leacock, such as having a float in the Paradise anniversary parade to promote our church in the community. Don't forget the work put into the baked goods wheel of fortune manned at the Gap Balloon Festival, and of course, the spectacular organ dedication concert and reception. All these activities are vital to our standing in the community, and the persons who work tirelessly to make them happen understand well their importance.

The total given in August to special funds and projects was \$11,486.60. The breakdown of this is \$10,861.60 for the Organ Fund and \$625 for Trustee projects.

Thank you to all who found it in their hearts to give to the special funds and programs. The Stewardship Committee thanks everyone for all donations small and large, not only of money but of time and talent as well.



LECTURE LEE BARRETT FROM LANCASTER THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 2

Light supper: 6:30 p.m. Lecture: 7:00 p.m.

On Friday, November 2, we will welcome Dr. Lee Barrett, the Mary B. and Henry P. Stager Professor of Theology at Lancaster Theological Seminary. This will be the fourth time we've welcomed Dr. Barrett to Leacock, and he will be speaking on the following timely topic:

Christian Faith and the 2012 U.S. Presidential Election

We Christians are commanded to actively care for the well-being of all our neighbors, and therefore to support governmental policies that promote the well-being of our neighbors. The problem is that Christians disagree sharply about what counts as the well-being of our neighbors, and also about what political and economic policies would best help our neighbors.

In fact, the tensions between "red state" Christians and "blue state" Christians are becoming bitter and deep.

We shall examine the ways in which both presidential candidates try to justify the appropriateness of their platforms in terms of the mandate to love our neighbors. Our perspective will be nonpartisan, and we will strive to be fair to all perspectives.

If you've never heard Dr. Barrett lecture, you're in for a real treat. If you have heard him speak, you know you'll want to be there. We expect a lively, informative, and interesting conversation, so please join us.

Matters of Faith—Questions for a Pastor

Nine months ago, when I started this series, I was a bit apprehensive. I had no idea how it would be received, and I knew that some of the questions were going to require more than a little prayer and thought and study. To my surprise, it appears that folks are following the series and enjoying it. And I've actually come to look forward to tackling each new question. So, thanks to the mysterious person who slipped the list into my folder almost a year ago—and who's made it possible to continue the series by offering another set of questions.

This month's question is the last of the original set—"How could Jesus be raised by sinful parents? (Only <u>he</u> was without sin.) Would he not have misbehaved as a child? Did he get sick, like other humans could?" It's still September, but somehow December doesn't feel all that far away (maybe because it's pretty chilly tonight). And this question has a bit of a Christmas feel. The short answer is that we don't know. Apart from the stories of his birth in *Matthew* and *Luke*, hardly anything is written about Jesus' youth—in fact, *Mark* and *John* don't even speak of his birth.

But we do have one, rather suggestive, story in *Luke*. It appears that when Jesus was 12, his parents took him to Jerusalem on their annual trip for Passover. We can imagine the swirl of people, as Jews gathered from all over the world to celebrate this holiday of deliverance. As *Luke* tells it, the festival ended and, probably a bit weary, Joseph and Mary join the crowd leaving Jerusalem for their trip home to Nazareth. A day into their journey, they notice the boy was missing. Nowadays, child welfare would probably be contacted—I mean, how could it have taken a day to notice that their son wasn't around? Sure, he might've been with friends or relatives as the text suggests, but a day? Anyway, they hurry back to Jerusalem and eventually find him in the temple, attentively listening to what are called "the teachers" and asking them questions. And it seemed that this boy already had a pretty deep understanding, pretty impressive wisdom.

In our faith, we claim that Jesus was fully divine, and his ability to hold his own with some of the scholars of Judaism seems to point to that side of him. But we also claim that Jesus was fully human. And there are more than a few parents who have had the wonderful experience of discovering at the mall, if not the temple, that their child has wandered off, intent on some project they never bothered to share with anyone. So, you might say that here he misbehaved a bit. It sure caused his folks worry, even though he pointed out that he had to be in his father's house. His parents were mortal, and being so were sinful, not always quite doing what they should, being confused, even if they tried their hardest. And yes, they do not always "get" who their son is—why, in *Mark 3*, they try to get him under control when people start to think he's crazy. But you know, he was fully human. And I wouldn't be surprised if as a baby he had the colic; if he broke an ox-cart wheel or two tossing a ball around with his friends; if there weren't long, anxious nights that Mary sat by his bedside, trying to cool his hot forehead when he was sick. In a strange way, all that would be an opportunity for love. And that, in the beginning and in the end, is what our Lord was all about.


