#### Notes from the Manse

Over the years, I have shared with you some of the stories of my life. As I was reflecting on the coming end of summer, I thought of one such adventure that happened when I was in college. My roommate at Haverford was from San Diego, and he often sang the praises of California, especially southern California, living. To prove his point, he invited me to visit his folks, promising to introduce me to everything from the Pacific to Yosemite and the mountains east of him. It was a great time, though I was shocked to learn that the ocean out there was frigid. And he never did convince me they had the four seasons I so cherished—blooms on a cactus don't really suggest to me a seasonal change.

One of the high points of our time together was to be a backpacking trip up and into the Sierra Nevada's. Those mountains, so young and high compared to most eastern mountains, were indeed breathtaking. It was late summer, early fall, as I remember, and we had the trail mostly to ourselves. That trail wound through woods with towering trees and along cliff faces overlooking deep valleys and other, faraway peaks. My friend had told me we were heading to one peak in particular. But it was only when we camped beneath it one evening that he explained why. It seems that he and his sister went after the same peak the year before and got caught in a freak snowstorm. Not only did they never quite reach the top, but they almost got frostbitten in the weather. Well, now he was going to beat that peak. When we woke the next morning, incredibly enough the temperature had dropped and clouds were rolling in. We quickly broke camp and practically ran the rest of the way to the top, then back to grab our stuff and head down. It was all a bit nerve wracking, for if it snowed very much, the trail would have effectively disappeared. But luckily, we made it down and were all right.

Now, you may think the whole idea was a bit foolish, and you'd probably be correct. And since then, I must say, I've learned that as mortal creatures we cannot always impose our will, on a mountain, on life. My friend and I did not expect a snowstorm; it was far too early in the year. But it had been too early the year before when his sister and he attempted the same peak. One of the hard lessons of life is that winter can come suddenly, even in what we think are our summers or falls or springs. Illness, financial strain, heartache can bring their chill when we least expect them.

But that is not the end of the story. In *Genesis*, just after the flood, God gives a reassuring word: "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease." The promise of God is that life never ends in winter; there will always be another spring; life will always come again. And there's something more, something that makes it possible to endure the storms that come so cold, so sudden. In the first chapter of *Matthew*, an angel of the Lord told Joseph that his wife would bear a son and that his name would be Emmanuel, which means God is with us. And in the last line of that same Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples—tells us—that he is with us always, to the end of the age. God is with us, in all the passing seasons of life, the good and the bad. And in that promise may we all find strength and peace.

We ended July with our year to date offering slightly behind year to date expenses for 2012, with a difference of about \$3,000.00. Where possible, spending was controlled, as demonstrated by the 48% of budget used after seven months versus the planned 58%. The total given to special funds and projects year to date through July was \$38,645 compared to \$28,448 for the same period in 2011. Although our offering to budget is slightly low, when calculating in our special fund giving, we are still doing well. This displays care and concern for our Trustee projects and the Organ fund. Thank you to all who found it in their hearts to give to the special funds and programs. Please remember the Stewardship Committee also thanks everyone for all offerings small and large, not only of money but of time and talent as well.

#### MISSION COMMITTEE




There will be no formal program so feel free to come and go as it suits your schedule.

#### MATTERS OF FAITH—QUESTIONS FOR A PASTOR

It's another newsletter and that means it's time for another in the series of questions I have been attempting to answer. As most of you probably recall, at the end of last year a mysterious stranger sent me a list of questions that he or she had pondered over and thought might be of interest to others in the congregation. I'm nearing the end of the first series, but have no fear—our anonymous correspondent sent me a few others around Easter time. But let's get onto this month's question: "Please help me understand the apparent mystery of dinosaurs and other prehistoric animals living and dying off long before "today's" animals. Weren't all animals created on the same day?"

Well, first off, as most any kid will tell you, dinosaurs are indeed a mystery, a wonderful mystery indeed. I can still remember my first visit to the Museum of Natural History in New York. Oh, was I fascinated by the reconstructed skeletons of a huge Brontosaurus and, of course, the fierce Tyrannosaurus Rex! And I have to admit that when Emily and I visited that museum a few years back, I just had to make a trip up to the dinosaur hall. But the question this month touches on what, for many people of faith, has been a troubling question for over a century. Doesn't Genesis 1 state clearly that God created the heavens and the earth in six days? And if you trace out the genealogies listed in Scripture, doesn't that show that the earth cannot possibly be as old as scientists say it is? Further, doesn't such a time span make it impossible for dinosaurs to have existed when science tells us they did? And if God had finished creating, how could other animals have since come to be?

All of this is what some folks call the old earth/young earth controversy. But I'm not sure that there really needs to be a controversy. First, *2 Peter 3:8* states, "But do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years and a thousand years are like one day." Put simply, God's time is not ours, and the time of creation to which the writer of *Genesis* refers could well be, in our terms, thousands and thousands of years. Further, *Genesis 1 and 2* seem to tell two different accounts of creation. In the first chapter, the sea creatures and birds are created on the 5<sup>th</sup> day; the creatures of the earth, including human beings, are created on the 6<sup>th</sup>. *Genesis 2* indicates that Adam was created first, then the Garden, then many other creatures, and last (sorry, women) Eve. Both chapters make important theological points about God and God's purpose in creation. And those points seem more important than any strict order.

The founder of Reformed Christianity, of which Presbyterians are a part, was Calvin, and he insisted that science was a good thing, something to be pursued, for our minds and ability to reason were gifts from God. It just sometimes seems sad that there are people out there who want to pit science and religion against each other. Both have much to teach us; each can and should complement the other. Perhaps we need to be humble and not assume that our reason somehow limits God. An old earth? How could that simple idea ever limit, ever negate the activity and will of a loving Creator? I suspect God gets a chuckle or sometimes a bit of sorrow over all our wrangling.

Community Outreach - (Next meeting: Thursday Sept. 6 at 7:30 p.m. All are welcome to join us.)

Our biggest news from the Outreach Committee is that, after many, many years of service in our community, we have merged our food bank with the larger community effort being supervised by The Factory Ministries. Although we, along with other local churches, have done a superb job of keeping the food bank up and running, we (and the other churches in our community) realized that this larger food bank could offer so many things to the community that this just made sense. For instance, The Factory is able to participate in the Central PA Food Bank, which provides free and very low-cost foods to organizations. The Factory also has volunteers and paid staff to handle calls, intake, and distribution, and they have full business hours to do so. The most compelling reason to merge (or, at least, what we on the outreach committee found most compelling), though, is that The Factory plans to offer classes to help those who use the food bank learn about things like savvy shopping, healthy eating habits, and healthy, cost-effective cooking methods. Leacock members will be able to volunteer with any aspect of the food bank they like, so please think about doing so, which gives us the opportunity to give Leacock a face beyond our church doors. Meanwhile, a big thanks goes to committee member Karen Homsher for all the work she has done with the food bank for so long and for handling the transition phase. Thank you, also, to all those who have ever volunteered your time (or been the secretary taking calls) or given money and food to support the food bank over the years. We hope you will continue to do so.

The community book and movie discussion group had a terrific discussion in August for *Blue Like Jazz* by Don Millar, a thought-provoking book that led us down many different and interesting paths. Our next book will be *The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian* by Sherman Alexie. The date for that discussion is yet to be determined, so go ahead, get the book and read it. You've got plenty of time, and it's David Homsher's favorite sort of book (short). Meanwhile, we will be hosting another potluck dinner to watch the movie version of *Blue Like Jazz* on Sunday September 30<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 p.m. Even if you didn't read the book, come join us, and bring a favorite covered dish.

We need baby sitters in October (tentatively the 3<sup>rd</sup> and the 4<sup>th</sup> from 4:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.) to kick off our new babysitting initiative. We'll be calling you, but just in case you don't get a call and would like to help, please contact a member of the committee (Emily Birch, Charlene Boas, Robbin Englehart, and Emily Birch). Don't think of it as babysitting. Think of it as VBS-extended, a time for fun for kids of all ages. We will be showing a movie and/or cartoons/old T.V. shows and offering the kids snacks while their parents attend the conferences and then enjoy a little time without their kids.

Mark your calendars, because we've set a date for the Caring Family potluck kickoff. We will be hosting this event on the first Sunday in Advent, December 2. at 5:00 p.m. Come meet the members of your caring family, join in some fun activities with them, and gather with all for a hymn/carol sing in the sanctuary. Details to come (keep an eye on your mailbox this fall).

Finally, we have some very exciting news. The Lebanon Valley College Chorus, of which our own Stephan Englehart is President, will be adding Leacock to its spring tour next March. If you already happen to have a 2013 calendar (and you're Lancastrians. Why wouldn't you?), you can mark that calendar as well. The date is Saturday March 23 at 7:00 p.m.

Phew! That's a lot of information for one committee for one newsletter. You can't accuse the outreach committee of being slackers, but, as you can see, it might be nice to have some help. Dispatches to God's Household: The General

Epistles by Nancy Benson-Nicol

The six books of the New Testament explored in this study—1 and 2 Peter, 1–3 John, and Jude—teach us what it means to live in community, what it means to belong to the household of God. A subset of New Testament letters known as the General Epistles, these letters were written to be shared and read aloud in early Christian communities.

During the time in which the authors of these letters lived. believers regarded one another as members of God's family. Thus, a guiding and powerful metaphor in these epistles is the understanding of family what it means in the world of the Roman Empire as contrasted with the more expansive idea of being a member of God's household through the Holy Spirit. These letters were meant to inspire and comfort the faithful in first-century Asia Minor, and they continue to speak to us today as we grapple with how to live in community as disciples of Christ.

We have two Bible Study groups for Women of Leacock. The Monday Morning group will begin this 9 lesson study on Monday October 1 at 7:30am, meeting in the church Fellowship Hall. Walkers gather at 7:00am to enjoy some physical exercise prior to light breakfast foods and spiritual enrichment in community.
