Notes from the Manse

"But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart."—Luke 2:19 "But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things."—Luke 23:49

When I was little, before Peter was even born, my family lived in a small apartment in Queens, NY. Strangely, though I was very young, there is much about those days I remember. The world seemed incredibly big and still filled with wonder, and I loved to explore the huge forest that began across the field behind our apartment building or to look at the lights on the bridges from the windows of our car as I sat on the backseat with my legs, still so short, stretched straight. Years later, when I went back to see that apartment building, the lights on the bridges didn't shine so brightly and that forest was really little more than a stand of trees. But there are other memories that have not lost any of their luster. For instance, on Saturday afternoons my Mom and Dad had a little ritual that each seemed to look forward to with anticipation. Dad would haul out a small square of rug and carefully place it in front of the big, clunky radio they had. Mom would position a chair a bit behind and to the side, where she respectfully could watch. Dad would turn on the radio when the Metropolitan Opera began its live broadcast, and as the music played, he would conduct, as if he stood on that marvelous stage. And when the music was over, Mom thunderously clapped. Then, when another program came on, with, I seem to recall, some kind of big band swing music, the two of them would dance, oh, would they dance! And through it all, I watched absorbing all I saw.

I can't say that the music did much for me—opera was way beyond a little kid, and the other songs didn't always make that much sense to me. But I learned so much those Saturday afternoons. For I saw my parents, together in a way that was different from the way they were usually together. I thought a lot about what I saw in my childlike way. And I discovered then much about love, about grace.

By the time you read this, most likely Easter will have passed, but at least on some levels all the songs and flowers and joyous alleluias will linger in our minds. But what about the days before Easter? What about that most holy week of the year that moves from Palm Sunday to Easter dawn? The two scripture passages above come early and late, at Jesus' birth and at his death. Somehow, I don't think it's a coincidence that they share a common idea; I don't think Luke did much by accident. In the first, Mary treasures the strange words the shepherds had told her and in her heart, she ponders them. In the second, those who knew Jesus, especially the women, stood and watched "these things," all that happened on that good Friday. Perhaps, we too should treasure and ponder the words that describe Christ's passion. Perhaps, we should see with new eyes, as best we can, all that happened at that last supper, the prayer and sleep on the Mount of Olives, the shabby, oh, so human, trials, the long walk to the cross, the darkness, the death. If we do so, as Jesus said we should, like a little child, we may learn something, the greatest thing there is to learn. We may learn, as I did when I was little but in a far more wonderful way, what is love, what is grace.



TRUSTEE TALK

We would like to thank everyone (approximately 20 people) who came out on Leacock Work Day. A special thank you to Dean Englehart who was literally swinging from the tree on the front lawn to trim the branches! The windows were cleaned, flower beds mulched, fence straightened, areas organized, roof and bell tower inspected, filters changed and cleaned.

Inspections done on work day found that the bell wheel needs to be repaired and the fascia on the building is rotting away at certain places.

The manse roof has been replaced and we have collected \$1,495 against the \$6,989 bill. After we let the inside ceiling dry, it will need repaired and painted at a cost of \$785.

We got a lot done, but there is still a lot more to do. We hope everyone had a good time helping to improve the look of our church while bonding with fellow church members.

If you'd prefer not to commit to a Saturday workday and would like to work on any of our "to do" list at any time, there will be a current list hanging on the cork board in the back hallway. We've got something for everyone, including a number of paint projects!

Keeping the Paradise and Old Leacock Churches looking good is a costly and never ending labor of love. We appreciate all your support.

CARING FAMILIES: MOVING FORWARD



Again, Jesus said, "Simon, son of John, do you truly love me?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take care of my sheep." John 21:16

Clearly, Jesus has told us that if we love him, we must take care of his sheep. All of us at Leacock are Jesus's sheep, and we most certainly are meant to care for each other. The Leacock Caring Families gives us the perfect opportunity to do so. Everyone in the church has been assigned to a family, and by now, you should know who the members of your caring family are. If you don't know who your family members are, check out the table in the narthex for an envelope with your name on it. Those of us involved in pulling this whole concept together and seeing it from idea to reality would just like to encourage you to take advantage of being a member of this small family within your larger church family.

Studies have shown that larger communities, such as churches, thrive when they are broken down into smaller groups. Our hope is that, whether you know the members of your family very well or not, you will get to know those you don't and will continue to care for those you do, embracing the notions of Christian love, caring, and unity by watching out for each other the way family members do. You can do this in whatever way you'd like. There are no "right" or "wrong" ways to be a member of a caring family. You just want to focus on sharing the joy of Christ's love by caring for each other. Some of you have asked for suggestions, so here are some ways you might put love into action:

- Be aware when members of your caring family are sick, or in need of some comfort for other reasons, and reach out to them in any way you feel might be appropriate (a phone call, a note, a card, a hospital visit, food, flowers, etc.).
- © If it's a member of your family's birthday or anniversary, again, you could call or send a card or a note or whatever you feel like doing.
- © If there are members of your family who have a hard time getting to church, either for Sunday services or other church events, offer them rides when you're attending.
- © Visit each other when the mood strikes.

We would also encourage you to be imaginative and to have fun. The idea is to embrace all the best of what families are and do. Some ideas you might want to consider:

- © "Family reunions" that might be a summer picnic at a park or a potluck at the church
- © "Family day trips" to nearby locations (historic site, museums, zoo, etc.)
- © "Family movie night" either at the church or in someone's home
- © "A progressive dinner" night, where families go from home to home for a different dinner coarse

Our expenses for the year so far are just slightly more than our income from generous offering. The cool weather is hanging on, and use of oil was up, so another delivery was required in February which is a significant expense. Let's hope for a warm spring! Even though we have needed to spend a bit more than we received, it is good to note we have spent less this year than we did last year for the same two months. We are trying to keep things under control as much as possible so we can fund our ministry to others as best we can. Please keep in mind, the funding that goes toward our benevolence and mission work is a percentage of our total offering. If offering is lower than expected to meet the budget fully, the funding for benevolence is commensurately lower too.

I would like to answer a question I received about Per Capita, and what it is. Our PCUSA General Assembly, our Synod and our Presbytery, have the authority to request a Per Capita Apportionment from the churches that are part of these organizational units. The General Assembly is, of course, our national leadership, and all PCUSA Churches are part of this. A Synod is a regional organization, and we are part of the "Synod of the Trinity." The Presbytery is the direct governing organization for churches located in this smaller geographical area within a Synod. We are part of the "Donegal Presbytery." "Per Capita" is a Latin term that translates to "by head." The term is typically used to mean "per person." In our situation, this means every member of the church, specifically Leacock Presbyterian Church. Our Session has agreed to pay each year a Per Capita apportionment based upon the number of members we have to our Presbytery which then divides the total amount and gives it to the Synod and General Assembly. You will notice in your envelope box, a lonely little envelope that has "Per Capita" printed on it. Our hope is that each member will offer the amount of the per capita apportionment and give it to Leacock to defer the cost of paying this. This year, the total amount per member is **\$28.90**. The breakdown of this by the three organizations is: General Assembly - \$6.87, Synod -\$2.20, Presbytery - \$19.83. Stay tuned next month! I will describe what these organizations use these funds for (why they are important), and in the meantime if you have not already, please consider placing **\$28.90 per church member** in your household into that envelope and dropping it into the offering next Sunday. Thank you all from the Stewardship Committee.
