Notes from the Manse

Let me tell you a story. It's a true story, but then all stories are true in their own way. Better than perhaps anything else, stories can teach us, teach us much. Ideas or facts or laws on their own often can mean little to us. But embody them in a story and it's amazing how they come to life. Jesus showed us this, in stories of good Samaritans and lost sons welcomed home. So, yes, let me tell you a story. There is a young man named Cameron Lyle who graduated from the University of New Hampshire just last Saturday. He wasn't a natural athlete; he didn't get a full athletic scholarship to attend the school. But, oh, he loved to compete and he gave himself fully to track, to field events such as the shot put and discus. In time, his hard work earned him a bit of a scholarship, enough to pay for his books. However, through three years he had never won a gold medal, only silver ones. His senior year, he knew, would be different.

Well, he was right, but, as is so often the case, in ways he did not expect. Two years ago, the athletes at UNH were urged to participate in a program on campus in which people had their mouths swabbed. The swabs were then sent to the National Marrow Donor Program's database. The students were told that the odds were infinitesimal that a match would be found. It only took about five minutes and it seemed like a good cause, so Lyle agreed to be swabbed. Fast-forward two years, to this March. Just as Cameron was working out to get ready for his final track season, he received a phone call from the donor program, asking that he have some additional blood work done. He agreed and it was confirmed that he was a match for a 28-year-old man who had leukemia and who would die in six months if he did not receive a bone marrow transplant. The folks at the program were honest: the procedure would be painful, had a real, if slight, chance of serious complications, and would debilitate him for some time after. But Cameron didn't hesitate; he didn't confer with his mother or friends; he just said yes. He thought his coach would be upset, but, no, that coach only respected him. As he put it, Cameron could try to win a medal or he could save a life. Well, Cameron chose to save a life. On April 24th, he underwent the almost two hour procedure. Afterwards, this young man who had been able to bench press 325 pounds had to have his girlfriend help him tie his shoes. Gone was the track season; gone was the chance for gold. But Cameron won something far more important. And his mother now says that he taught her much she'll never forget, that he, now more than ever before, is her hero.

We are now in the season of Pentecost, and Luke in *Acts* says that on that day long ago there was a rush of violent wind and tongues of fire. I don't know why Cameron made the decision he did; I don't know anything about his faith. But I believe that the Holy Spirit swept into his life like a wild wind and touched him with those tongues of fire. For he now speaks to people a word that before he did not know, a word that is changing lives as it inspires others to find out if they too are matches. We do not all have to be heroes like Cameron. But, oh, let us let the Spirit come and blow through our lives; let us let the Spirit touch us with tongues of fire. For then, in large or small ways, we, like Cameron, may say a new word that loves and heals. We may speak a word of grace.




MAY SESSION SNIPPETS

Expenses through April are higher than our income from offering, continuing the trend from the first three months of the year. April of 2012 was a strong month for offering; it would be a wonderful thing if we see a strong May and June this year to get us back on track!

Important to note the percent of budget spent is in line with 2012, and is lower than what could be expected (33%) after 4 months, but we still need to make up a lot of ground!


The lower offering unfortunately also affects our contributions to benevolence. At the end of April \$4,179 was transferred to our benevolence account to be used by our Mission Committee to help others locally, nationally and internationally.

Because offering is lower, the amount transferred for benevolence use is also lower than anticipated. To meet the Mission Committee's plan, we would like to see over \$5,000 each month!

Thank you to all who give generously of their time, talents and monetarily to allow our church to do the work of Jesus Christ.
