

Notes from the Manse

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near." Philippians 4:4,5

Do you remember snow days? When I was a kid, I considered them to be among the most wonderful, magical things on earth. It didn't matter if I had all my homework done or was well prepared for a test. There was just something about suddenly being given a pass, a reprieve from responsibility and pressure and expectations. I loved snow days when I was a student, and if truth be told, I loved them when I was a teacher. I worked at a boarding school, so really there was no reason to cancel classes; neither teachers or students had very far to walk from dorm or apartment. But the headmaster understood something about the human spirit, and every so often he would just announce, doggone it, we were going to have a snow day. Those days seemed just to be filled with light, a kind of wild, free happiness. And that light lingered in the weeks to come.

Paul told the people of the church in Philippi to let their gentleness be known, not to a special few. No, they were to show their gentleness to everyone. Well, this is the only newsletter for a couple of months, and I would like to suggest that everyone at Leacock resolve to make those months ones of gentleness. At that school where I taught, there was a new, young math teacher, who after only a month or so was pretty sure she had gotten into something way over her head. She would labor late into the night, mulling over, revising, lesson plans for the next day. Grading papers was an agony as she tried so hard to figure out how to give credit not just for right answers but for effort as well. And she'd practically break out into sweats before entering her classroom to face kids who were not that much younger than she. She had pretty much driven herself to a breakdown. Then one day, an older, or really, more experienced teacher took her aside and told her it was OK, that she'd be fine, that it would all make sense with time. And then he told her to take the next day, a Friday, off so she could have a long weekend. He offered her gentleness. In a way, he gave her a snow day.

That all worked because he was her department head; he had the authority to do so. That's what makes snow days work—it's almost like God says, "It's OK. Relax. Take a break." If we tried to give ourselves a snow day, it wouldn't work. It's like we need to be given permission. Well, it seems that Paul in *Philippians* is saying that all the members of the body of Christ have that authority, and that we should use it, to be gentle, to grant each other snow days. So, if you see somebody who gives so much to the church and is beating themselves up because they left something undone, tell them it's OK, offer to help them, or maybe remind them that the fate of the western world probably isn't dependent on that task. Or if you know of someone who is carrying the weight of a problem with a friend or a family member, take them out one night or whisk them away somewhere for a fun day. And perhaps most important, try to be gentle with yourself. If you don't feel you can give yourself a snow day, remember it's already been granted to you. Jesus said he was gentle and humble of heart. Let us too be gentle, to everyone.

Janice Catron invites us to explore Exodus and Deuteronomy with her and see together the promise of what our relationship with God can be and the realities of what that relationship often becomes. It is God our Redeemer who, by grace, gives us the power to help ourselves and others live into the fullness God intends for us, and to move forward as people who have been set free.

The youth also began planning for Youth Sunday, which will be August 18th. Please join us for that, as it is shaping up to be something quite special.




LEACOCK BOOK AND MOVIE GROUP

Expenses through June are higher than our income from offering, continuing the trend from the first five months of the year. However, looking at June specifically, our offering was higher than the expenses, and we made up some ground on our YTD deficit. The June offering was roughly \$3,000 higher than expenses, resulting in a YTD deficit of \$2,061 after June. This is a definite improvement, but still doesn't quite reach the level we need to completely cover our operating costs and fund our ministry to others.

Please pray about and consider anything you could possibly do to help improve our current situation in getting closer to meeting our budget. We still have half a year to go in 2013!

CARING FAMILIES: MOVING FORWARD

Again, Jesus said, "Simon, son of John, do you truly love me?" He answered, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said, "Take care of my sheep." John 21:16

As I said earlier this year, but it bears repeating, Jesus clearly told us that if we love him, we must take care of his sheep. All of us at Leacock are Jesus's sheep, and we most certainly are meant to care for each other. The Community Outreach and Congregational Life Committees feel strongly about this, and we have decided to make August and September caring family months at Leacock. Just a reminder: everyone in the Leacock community has been assigned to a caring family, the purpose of which is to do just that, care for each other. This isn't a huge responsibility and is one of the major tenets of being a Christian. The Leacock Caring Families give us the perfect opportunity to reach out to everyone and to take advantage of being a member of a smaller family within a larger church family. We will be posting the family assignments in the Narthex, in case you don't know who your family is, and we encourage you to reach out in any way you feel like doing so. There are no "right" or "wrong" ways to be a member of a caring family. You just want to focus on sharing the joy of Christ's love by caring for each other. Some of you have asked for suggestions, so here are some ways you might put love into action:

- Be aware when members of your caring family are sick, or in need of some comfort for other reasons, and reach out to them in any way you feel might be appropriate (a phone call, a note, a card, a hospital visit, food, flowers, etc.).
- If it's a member of your family's birthday or anniversary, again, you could call or send a card or a note or whatever you feel like doing.
- If there are members of your family who have a hard time getting to church, either for Sunday services or other church events, offer them rides when you're attending.
- Visit each other when the mood strikes.
- If you happen to see something for one of your family members (for instance, an offering box) sitting on the table in the Narthex, take it to him or her.

We would also encourage you to be imaginative and to have fun. The idea is to embrace all the best of what blood relatives are to each other and what they do for each other. Some ideas you might want to consider:

"Family reunions" that might be a summer picnic at a park or a potluck at the church

"Family day trips" to nearby locations (historic site, museums, zoo, etc.)

"Family movie night" either at the church or in someone's home

A "progressive dinner" night, where families go from home to home for a different dinner coarse
