### **Notes From the Manse**

*“Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.”*

*1 Thessalonians 5:16-18*

The will of God in Christ Jesus for you—those are pretty strong words. They were addressed originally to the church in Thessalonica. And it’s helpful to consider what most scholars believe to be the context of this letter. This was the first of Paul’s letters, written sometime between 41 and 51 AD; it, therefore, is the earliest of all the New Testament texts, the closest to the time of the first Easter. Timothy had brought Paul what he calls the “good news” of the faith and love of that congregation. But there is a darker subtext. Apparently, that early church had suffered in some ways. And there was a sadness among those people. Christ had not returned as soon as Paul had thought, and folks worried about what was going to happen to those who had died.

Now, we might expect Paul to offer words of encouragement, to address the hurt and confusion that was there and try to make it better. And he does do that. But look at the words I began with. In the end—and it is towards the end of the letter—Paul says that God wills for those people then, and we believe, for all who would follow, that they, that we do three things. Curiously, even in the midst of trouble, God wills that we rejoice, that we find room for joy not only when things seem to be going well, but always. That can be tough to do. Sometimes our hearts are so heavy, we see only shadows. And the Lord knows that; it’s OK with him. But if we think about it, if we look around a bit, even in the darkest times we will find a reason to rejoice. Second, we are to pray without ceasing, to pray, yes, for help when we hurt, but also to pray for others, to pray that God’s good kingdom will finally, fully, be here. And then, third, we are to give thanks in all circumstances, even those that are tough. For God blesses us always, in ways we often might miss, if in no other way by being with us, bearing with us the troubles that come.

Back when Emily and I were dating, I went through a tough time. I was living with my Dad, fitfully trying to get some writing done. Well, the writing wasn’t going well, my father was growing old before my eyes, and it just seemed that things were in a downward spiral. Every day, I’d go out to get the mail, mostly to help Dad, but also because I was hoping to get something uplifting. Well, one morning what I hoped for came, but not in a letter or a package. I had given Emily a small stuffed animal for Valentine’s Day that she had named Bobbie. When I opened that mailbox, I found Bobbie right there at the front. It was like the sun had broken through the clouds, for I knew someone cared, someone loved me. And, oh, I was grateful; I felt blessed.

So let us do what God wills. Let us rejoice, always; let us pray without ceasing. And one thing more. In a few weeks, it will be Thanksgiving. Between now and then, make a list of what you are grateful for, big and small. Then, at the Thanksgiving Eve service or the next day, share that list; speak it out loud. And give thanks to the God who loves you, who is with you, who blesses you, in the good times and the bad.

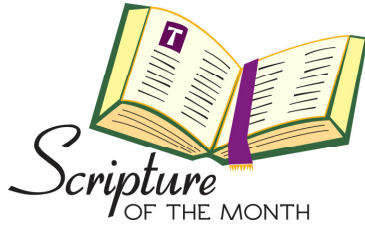


in the sanctuary to kick off the Advent season. Come prepared to request your favorite hymns/ carols. We’ll see you there!

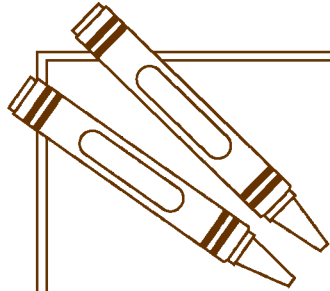

The Paradise CROP Walk signs and materials were easy to find this year.

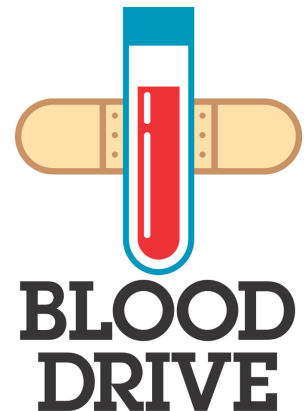

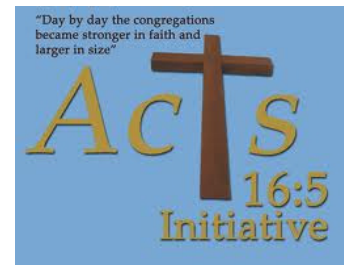

We ended September with our total year to date offering \$17,800 behind year to date expenses for 2012. Only 56% of the budget has been spent through the end of September versus 60% this time last year. In addition to the offering that goes toward our expenses, an additional \$2,020 was given during September toward special funds, such as the Organ Fund and the Building and Facilities Fund.

The bad news is there is still a sizable deficit! As we enter the last quarter of the year, please consider any additional help you could provide, so we can fully support our ministry toward others and our budget in general.

## CROSSROADS SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS

The Crossroads Class was started in May of 1947 to fill the need of a group of young adults for a coeducational Bible class. In the beginning it was officially known as the Young Adult Class. This class met each Sunday morning in the choir loft of the sanctuary for Bible study. It also met the second Tuesday of each month at the homes of the members for a business meeting and a time of fellowship. The class chose for its motto: "Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith," which is taken from Hebrews 12:2

Because the choir loft was not the ideal place for a Sunday School class to convene, the Young Adult Class fully realized the need for a new Christian education building. Members of the class gave staunch support to the many fund raising projects for this cause. Some of these projects were bake sales, chicken and waffle suppers, strawberry festivals and making apple butter in a large copper kettle. A Friendship Quilt was made which included the names of all of the class members embroidered on it. This was auctioned off and it now hangs in the hallway.

Over the years the class has given money towards supporting the physical maintenance of both churches. It financed the reupholstering of the pulpit chairs, contributed towards the purchase of junior choir gowns and gave generously to the war memorial project. It has also contributed over the years to many local and foreign mission projects.

Recreational activities were sponsored by the class such as weekend trips to a mountain cabin, swimming parties on the Chesapeake Bay and bus trips to the New York World's Fair and other trips to Philadelphia and Washington, DC.

In 1968, the class began to sponsor a retreat to Camp Donegal each year. The first year there were 75 people in attendance.

The original constitution of the class limited membership to the class to persons between the ages of 19 and 35. By 1953, some of the members no longer fitted into this age category. After much discussion and procrastination, it was voted to grow old gracefully together; and in 1959, a motion passed to change the constitution to read simply, "Membership of this organization shall consist of men and women." Later the name was changed to the Crossroads Class. This name was taken from the title of the



study guide used on Sunday mornings.

In addition to its own projects, the class members have given constantly to support Leacock Presbyterian Church and its mission. Most of the members have served as teachers and on the church boards. They have not glided through life, but have dared to stop at each crossroad to seek the Lord's guidance so that they can better serve him.

On Saturday, October 12, 2013, with nostalgic thoughts racing through their minds, the Crossroads Class decided to disband. Many of us remember the highpoints of the class and the many great and good things that the members did, but age has taken its toll.

Thanks to the Crossroads members for their  
many contributions to the life of Leacock  
Presbyterian Church.

We are very happy to have them as members  
of the Adult Class where their vast knowledge  
gained from years of experience is most  
welcome.

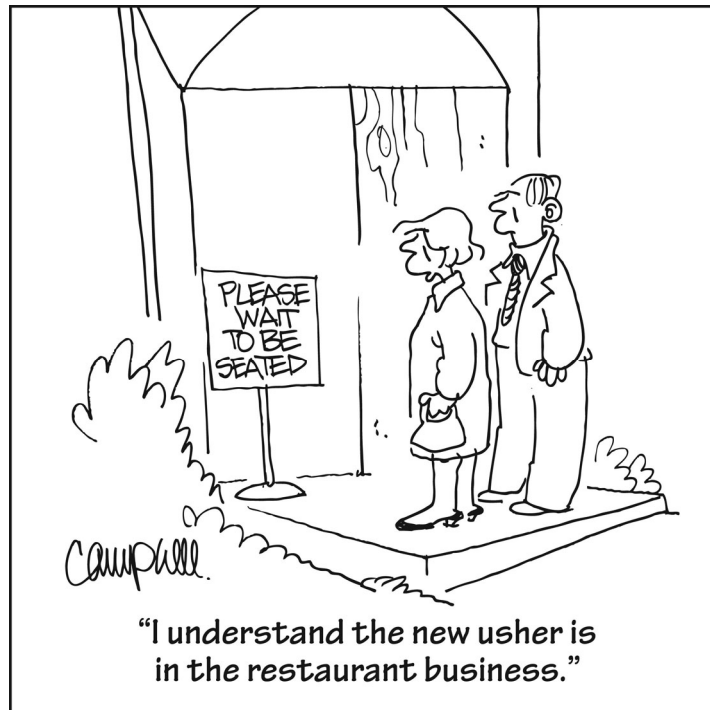
