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#### **Notes From the Manse**

In many ways, this holiday season we are about to enter has become a pretty crazy time. So-called Black Friday has become almost an unofficial national holiday in its own right. And somehow in the midst of all the sales and canned music, Thanksgiving is almost forgotten or at best given a brief nod in the race to Christmas shopping. This is why, I think, that Advent is so important for those who follow Christ. For it should make us stop in the midst of all the bustle and think about what this season is really all about.

Advent is a time of great joy as we celebrate the coming of the one we call Lord. We, like Mary, can well say, "My spirit rejoices in God my savior." For with the birth of Jesus began the renewal of the world, the rebirth of creation to be once more what God intended it to be. But change is never easy. Remember the reaction of the shepherds when the angel of the Lord appeared to them—they were scared to death. The angel told them not to be afraid, that he brought good news of great joy for all the people. And note how they then responded—they went to see this thing that had taken place. They told the parents of the baby all they had seen and heard, and Mary—her response was to treasure what they had said, to ponder it in her heart. Well, the shepherds and Mary point the way for what we should do in this season of Advent. We should treasure the word we have heard, the good news of the Word made flesh. And we should take the time in our busy lives to think about what it all means, how it should change not only the world, but also our whole lives. We should go, look about us, seek the signs of this thing that has taken place, the light that has come into the world.

In the book of Zechariah, we are told not to despise a day of small things. It can be easy sometimes to see only the brokenness of the world. But when we look more closely we will see the signs of a world even now being redeemed; we will see signs of grace. There was a time when I felt lost. I was miserably unhappy working at a business that seemed more concerned about the bottom line than its people. In the last recession, we were doing better than most, but still our parent company demanded layoffs so our profits could prop up other divisions. One day, some friends came to see Emily and me. Their young daughter, Jessica, could barely contain herself, for she had made me a present. Shyly, she held it out to me—it was a bracelet beaded with wonderfully colored stones. It was too big to wear, but, oh, did I cherish that bracelet. It didn't cost a lot; it was one of those small things of which Zechariah spoke. But it was a needed light in a shadowed time. I kept that bracelet on my desk; I wouldn't let Emily put it away when she was straightening things. And whenever I was down, I'd pick it up, run my fingers over it, and I'd feel a bit better.

Thank you, Jessica, for your bracelet. For it was a gift of grace, a reminder that there are things stronger than brokenness. And so I invite all of us, to spend this Advent and really always looking for the signs that our King has come. When we see them, let us rejoice; with eagerness, with hope, let us cry out for him to come again and complete the work he's begun.

Although we are entering one of the most joyous and celebratory times of the church year, we must remember that darkness comes before dawn. That is what Advent is about: our waiting expectantly for the coming of the Christ. Much of our December music will reflect this reality of our faith journey.

During the four Sundays of Advent, we will be singing one verse of a Yiddish folk song as the Advent candles are lit by church families. The tune, whose name means "deep in the forest," underscores the waiting theme of this season, ending with an unfinished feeling, as the promise is still being fulfilled.

Additionally, four of our junior high youth will be accompanying the singing with bells. The words to this hymn were written by Wayne Wold, a contemporary composer:



Light one candle to watch for Messiah: let the light banish darkness. He shall bring salvation to Israel, God fulfills the promise.

Light two candles to watch for Messiah: let the light banish darkness. He shall feed the flock like a shepherd, gently lead them homeward.

Light three candles to watch for Messiah: let the light banish darkness. Lift up your heads and lift high the gateway for the King of glory.

Light four candles to watch for Messiah: let the light banish darkness. He is coming, tell the glad tidings. Let your lights be shining.

Rather than singing the "Gloria Patri" after the Assurance of Pardon, we will sing the refrain of "Angels We Have Heard on High," praising our God for abundant mercies.

Finally, our Doxology, following the offering, will be the sung to the same tune but use these

O glorious God to You we bring All that we are as offering Spirit of joy, within us dwell; Come, Jesus, our Emmanuel.

All of this information will appear in each week's bulletin at the appropriate place in the service, so that no one has to worry about what to sing when.

Music speaks to our souls and raises our spirits. It is our hope that the music during Advent will minister to you and fill your hearts with joyous expectation.

We ended October with our total year to date offering \$20,082 LESS THAN our year to date expenses for 2013. In addition to the offering that goes toward our expenses, an additional \$3,442 was given during October toward special funds, such as the Organ Fund and the Building and Facilities Fund. As we go through the last two months of the year, please consider any additional help you could provide, so we can better support our ministry toward others and our budget in general.

During our congregational meeting on November 17<sup>th</sup> we all approved a 2014 budget amount of \$226,889, compared to the 2013 budget of \$251,276. This is a significant reduction and represents an effort to bring our budget into alignment with actual giving from the last two years. Even with this reduction, we will be challenged in 2014 to meet our budget if giving stays at the same levels as during 2013/2012.

A question was raised at the congregational meeting regarding the Organ Fund. Since we are nearing the end of the fund raising effort, the question was asked as to whether we have the funds in the checking account to repay the \$30,000 in loans put into the fund and used to help pay for the organ repairs. The answer is YES, we have the money to pay back the loans but no, it doesn't reside in the checking account. Our Session decided that if the way be clear, we will pay back the loans at the end of this year. The decision as to whether the way is clear or not, will be made by the Session in December. The reason the entire amount of the Organ Fund is not in the checking account is because of the deficit we are running between actual expenses and income from offerings. Offering has been below expenses each month for the entire year of 2013 (as shown in the newsletter reports), and in order to pay bills, the money in the checking account was used. There were two obvious alternatives to our use of the money in the checking account: One is to not pay bills and preserve the amount in the checking account for the fund, which is not a good alternative. The other way is to draw from the endowment funds. It would have been necessary to draw each month from the endowment to cover the difference between income and expenditure, which would have been difficult and time consuming, and would have removed money from the endowment fund at a time when the stock market was doing well. When the Session pays back the loans, the money will come from the endowment, at one time, versus being drawn monthly over the entire year to cover expenses. EVERY penny given for the Organ fund was indeed used to make the Organ repair possible.

#### ORGAN FUND FINAL REPORT

The first donation to the Organ Fund to pay for the organ rebuilding project of Leacock Presbyterian Church was made on May 15, 2011. This gift of \$40 was the first step towards reaching a goal of \$83,000. On October 13, 2013, a mere two years and five months later, our goal was faithfully met.

The church had its first (of many) Dine-Out Nite at Rita's in Gap in August, 2011. Other restaurants graciously donating a portion of their receipts to the Fund included: Isaac's, Squireside Cafe, Texas Road House, Four Brothers, Friendly's, Bird-in-Hand and Bob Evan's.

In September of 2011, the Organ Fund Committee, under the chairmanship of Jan Huffman, launched the Pic-A-Pipe program. This program, in which persons could symbolically purchase an organ pipe, garnished a total of \$34,375 for the Fund.

In October of 2011, the church held its first yard and bake sale bringing in over \$1,800. This was followed by the local Amish community hosting a volleyball tournament in November, which brought in over \$1,000 to benefit the Fund.


Efforts continued during the winter and spring of 2012. Loose change was collected quarterly in a jar located in the Narthex, adding several hundred dollars to the Fund. In June of 2012, a \$30,000 loan program was instituted to pay the balance of the organ rebuilding.

During the Summer of 2012, the Leacock Crafters diligently made and sold their crafts, as well as baked goods, weekly at the Paradise Flea Market. Their efforts continued in 2013, resulting in several thousand additional dollars for the Fund.

On September 16, 2012, a dedication service and concert was held to celebrate the rebuilt organ, rich in its new-found quality and tone. Beth Denlinger-Hunter provided a program of beautiful music. An offering taken brought in another \$1,000.

The Lebanon Valley College Choir gave another concert in March of 2013 and donated the free-will offering of over \$700 to the Fund. Fund raising activities continued throughout 2013 and included selling Salad Works cards and holding additional bake sales, flea markets and a church corn roast in August.

Praise Be to God for this successful organ project and fund campaign. We are indeed indebted to every member of our church and community who worked and gave of their time and money to this mission.
