Notes From the Manse

"I am about to do a new thing: now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?"

Isaiah 43:19

When I was little, I used to take New Year's very seriously. There were those images of an old man leaving and a little baby arriving. I heard adults speak of New Year's resolutions, and it never registered with me how few of them were actually kept. So, I thought this must be pretty important and I would concentrate real hard trying to figure out how I was going to become somebody new. It never really dawned on me, at that age, that that was precisely what I was, somebody new. It turns out Emily had a similar reaction to New Year's as a child. In fact, one New Year's Day, with a grim expression on her face, she resolved to be nice. It got her a bit down when the next day she did something mean to her little brother, but that just made her determined to be doubly nice from that point on.

Perhaps we can't keep all of our resolutions, but still a New Year can be a time for hope and new beginnings. And it feels that way at Leacock. The Session held its annual retreat at a new place, the Presbytery office, in the midst of a deluge that felt almost biblical. While grateful for the officers who have completed their terms, I am very excited about the new officers who promise to bring new energy and ideas—why, this year we even have a youth who is serving as a deacon. The deacons as a whole are looking at how they care for folks in need. The trustees have an array of projects they are considering. The Stewardship Committee is considering ways to get our budget in line, to cut costs creatively and to inspire folks to support their church as much as is needed and is possible. There are new adult Sunday School classes, either beginning or coming, with new leaders. The Mission Committee is mulling over how we should balance our mission efforts, locally and globally, and efforts are being made to increase our work with the Factory. Our youth group is growing and will soon be taking a trip into Philadelphia as part of their Make the Homeless Smile initiative. The Congregational Life/ Community Outreach joint committee, as well as the Session as a whole, is looking to come up with new and better ways for us to care for each other as a congregation. The Acts 16:5 group is starting a process that over the coming months will give us a chance as a church to look at everything we do, from worship to mission, open to new ways of doing things while affirming what we have done.

So, yes, there seems to be a new spirit afoot at Leacock. But that spirit will only last and thrive if we enter our work together with belief in each other and our possibilities. The Session, at their retreat, adopted a theme for the year—"Let's stop wringing our hands and start rolling up our sleeves." We do have challenges; every church does. And we need to address them. But the important thing is to get to work on what's possible and not endlessly dwell on the fact that these challenges exist. Even more important, however, is the need to remember who, in the end, makes all things possible. It is the Lord who is about to do a new thing. And if we but trust that the Lord can and will, our work will be productive; it will be blessed. So, let us with joy embark on a new year. Let us be about doing new things. For then we work with our Lord.


your leg in a hug, the kid who tells the school bully to stop picking on another kid.

Elders gathered on a gray Saturday at the Presbytery Office for their annual retreat. Although the weather raged with rain pounding on the windows and wind howling at times, inside a spirit of renewal, discovery, and enthusiasm reigned.

The Session adopted the theme - "Let's stop wringing our hands and start rolling up our sleeves" - as an invitation to rethink committee structures, closely examine Leacock's sense of stewardship and mission, and be more intentional about encouraging each other and celebrating the good that is happening at Leacock.

The seven hours spent together, including a working lunch, provided a time for candid discussion and serious planning.

The January stated meeting occurred at the end of the day and resulted in these actions:

- Scheduling the Annual Meeting of the Congregation for February 16 with one service of worship at 9:30am with February 23 as the snow date.




Book and Movie Group

As we kick off 2014, I decided it was a good idea to share this powerful piece with our congregation. Studies show that it's so important for ALL members of a church to interact with and to pay attention to the children who attend church. This gives some guidance and some ideas about how we might best serve the youngest members of our congregation.

Hey.

HEY!

Yes, thanks. Hello. It's me. I'm a kid in your church. Nice to meet you. I'm sure you've seen me before. I'm the one who sits with my family in front of you every Sunday. Remember that blur you saw running around the fellowship hall at the last potluck? Yours truly.

Now that I have your attention, I thought I'd share with you what I need from the church. Because there are a whole lot of ideas out there about what kids need to grow in the faith and stick with the church. Thing is, no one's bothering to ask us kids what we think. So here are some thoughts to ponder:

Just tell me the Bible story.

Christian Education

Honestly, I don't need gimmicks, flash, fluff. If I want entertainment, I'll ask my parents to take me to the movies. And please don't let some random B-rated Bible cartoon video do it for you. I want you to tell me the Bible story. You. Me. The Bible. That's it.

Remember: I can't sit still for long. Don't blame me. God made me this way. Anyway, just make your story-telling segments a little shorter and cut to the chase and help me experience the story with as many of my senses as possible. And when it comes to worship, give me something to do — "worship bags" (although I'd suggest changing them out frequently so I'm not coloring the same picture of Jesus every week).

Give me, at bare minimum, an hour a month with the pastor. This would be awesome. Because sometimes it feels like you all think that I'm too little or too young for the pastor. Which is just silly if you ask me (see scripture on Jesus and the children). Let the pastor tell me a Bible story or take me on a nature walk or just have doughnuts with me.

Give me some responsibility in the church. See, here's the thing; you expect me to be a bystander in church until I hit some age when



voila!, I'm suddenly supposed to dive in and do everything.
Honestly, that's silly. If you want me to grow up committed to and participating in the life of the church, you need to empower me to do so now. I'd make a great usher on Sunday morning. I know I could serve food at a meal for the homeless if you'd let me.

I like to be with my family and all ages together in worship. (Not always, but sometimes.) On some Sundays, allow me to stay for the entire worship service rather than escorting me out after the children's sermon. I enjoy being allowed to stay and hear what the grownups are hearing. I actually listen to sermons, and they stick with me - as you are well aware in other contexts, I'm great at remembering everything you adults say. I might get a little antsy (worship bags will help). But I promise you I won't fall asleep like that dude in front of me every week.

So that's it. Mainly just focus on telling the story and letting it be the focus. If you do that, I have a pretty good feeling I'll stick around in church for a long time.

- We ended the year 2013 with our total offering \$17,656 LESS THAN our expenses for 2013. Leacock received less in offering than what we spent in 2013, despite control of discretionary spending, and creativity in finding ways to save money.
- In 2013 \$45,192 from the offerings received went to Benevolence and helping others. This amount is a set percentage of the offering received. That percentage is set when a budget is approved. In 2013, that was 22.68% and in 2014 the percentage is 18%.
- In November and December \$2,841 was given to the special funds (Building & Facilities and Organ). In addition, a generous gift of \$500 was given to be used for the music program and a total of \$400 given specifically for benevolence.
- The 2014 budget was approved on November 17, and the total Is \$226,889. To support this budget, we need to receive an average of \$4,363 per week.


to use toward providing Sunday morning refreshments.
