#### **Notes From the Manse**

"The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them."

Isaiah 11:6

What a wonderful vision this is, a time of true and abiding peace. Yet that vision seems so far away from our broken human reality. Think of a child watching, listening, as his or her parents rage at each other. Or consider those parents, two people who once pledged their love to each other and who now seem to know only difference, only hurt, only fear. Think of two friends and all the time, all the memories they share, now, perhaps forever, driven apart by a broken trust or a broken heart. Think of a fellowship, a people come together who could do great things if they are together, but who instead split apart into bitter camps who cannot, who will not, forgive each other for wrongs real or imagined. And think of countries, of a world, at war, tearing apart families, communities.

When my mother died, my father wanted to take one last family trip with his two sons. So he arranged a trip to a place he'd always wanted to go, the Holy Land of his faith. And what a trip it was. I remember sitting in a café in a plaza in Jerusalem, getting ice cream on a hot day, only suddenly to notice the café, the plaza had emptied. When he signaled to the waiter, he nervously approached us and explained there was a bomb threat, a briefcase had been left at curbside. The bomb squad came and it turned out it was just a briefcase. But now we knew, now we understood, that this was a way of life for Israelis, something a part of the rhythm of their lives right alongside an astonishing vitality. During our trip we went to Jericho in the West Bank, and there we saw the other side. For this Palestinian town and the restaurant where we had lunch had a heavy stillness built up of wariness and fear. There was much more to our trip, awe and wonder and delight as we moved along ancient paths where David and Jesus may well have passed. But I never forgot the sorrow of the land. For here a people long exiled in turn exiled another people. Some believe that the name, Jerusalem, means the city of peace. How ironic, when so many die to claim it as theirs.

And so I wonder. Is peace in Israel and Palestine possible? Can two people who claim the same land live together? I just don't know—the words of *Isaiah* seem like such a dream. Yet the message of Scripture is clear. *Psalm 34*, for instance, says that whoever values and desires life needs to do a few, clear things—speak no evil, avoid evil, do good, and seek peace. Well, that is what I am going to do. Our denomination, the PCUSA, is leading a peacemaking trip to Israel and Palestine at the end of April and beginning of May. I applied to go, writing numerous essays, speaking to many folks, and was blessed to be chosen. I don't know what we will achieve. At the least I seek to learn more, from both sides. And I have hope, for though peace seems impossible, I remember that peace is a fruit of the Spirit, that in the end it is not up to me or our group or any human being, that God wills peace and therefore it will come. So, as *Psalm 122* says, pray for the peace of Jerusalem. Pray for me and our peacemaking mission. Pray that someday, all wolves, all lambs, will at last live together in peace.

If you know of someone who needs to be on the prayer chain, you may call the pastor, the church office, the prayer chain coordinator, or anyone on the prayer chain.

There is power in prayer. God hears all our prayers - those spoken and those unspoken - and answers them according to His will.





To meet our budget, we need to receive an average of \$4,363 each week. There were four Sundays in February, and we would have liked to see  $$4,363 \times 4$  or \$17,453 received in offering for January. We received a total of \$14,811 for February, which means we are \$17,453 - \$14,811 = \$3,527 behind our 2014 budget for the month of February, and for the year to date (Jan & Feb) \$34,904 - \$28,737 = \$6,167 behind budget.

As far as our actual expenditure versus offering, we are also tracking behind. \$31,763 has been spent and we received \$28,340 in offering. That is a deficit of \$3,423. At the very least, we need to be able to make up this shortfall and cover our actual expenses. Please consider how you could possibly help our church meet our financial responsibilities!
