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Notes From the Manse

When our peacemaking group left the Old City of Jerusalem, we headed south to a place on a hill called Tantur. In an ancient land, it is a relatively new place, established only some 40 years ago in 1972. It was created to be an ecumenical place of renewal and growth, where theologians and clergy could come to worship and study, to pray. It is a place for the mind, with a library holding over 70,000 volumes and meeting spaces where scholars can exchange questions and ideas. People from all over the world, from all denominations, room together, eat together, listen together.

But Tantur is also, perhaps most importantly, a place for the spirit. Jerusalem, so close, is a city of noise and hurry. Tantur has quiet. We shared a meal there. Before, we had time to walk the grounds, which in this dry land were like a miraculous oasis. Pebbled paths wandered among old trees and lush gardens speckled with a riot of bright colors. And it seemed everywhere one wandered there was always a place to sit in shade, alone with one's thoughts, one's prayers. After lunch, we were encouraged to go out on the roof of one of the buildings—the view, we were told, was spectacular.

And so it was, but not in a simple, touristy kind of way. To the north, we could see Jerusalem, the Old City with its walls and church spires and light shimmering off the gold of the Dome of the Rock, the newer parts of the city, with office towers and highways. To the south was Bethlehem and we could see the towers of the Church of the Nativity. To be between these two cities, so central to our faith, to be able to hold them both in our mind's eye so intimately—it did indeed stir the soul. Off to the east a bit was a large settlement, one of the largest in Palestine, where Jewish settlers have chosen to build a town or city on occupied land. And for the first time, we could see the Separation Wall, the wall built, Israelis will tell you, for security, the wall, Palestinians will tell you, that divides family member from family member, that keeps farmers from their own lands. The wall snakes around the countryside, not on the border of Israel and Palestine, but rather on Palestinian land. It does a strange zigzag around Rachel's Tomb, so that only Orthodox Jews may visit it. So, there before us was a spiritual landscape and a landscape marked by conflict, by distrust, by fear. And in the midst of it was Tantur, a Christian oasis in a troubled land.

The Christian community in Israel/Palestine is a small one these days. But one of our presenters told a tale of a town somewhere in the land where there is a house church filled by two brothers and their families, the only Christians in that town. When asked why they stayed, they said there should always be a Christian presence, no matter how small, to remind people of the gospel. Paul said in Romans that as far as it depends on us, we are to live in peace with everyone. And if the Spirit is in us, he said in Galatians, we will shine forth its fruits, love, joy, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self control, and, yes, peace. So there is indeed a need for a Tantur, a lonely house church in a town. There is a need for Christians in the Holy Land, people who make no claim on land, but who instead speak words of peace in the name of their Lord, who believe that blessed are the peacemakers, even if they must pay a price.




Books and Flicks

Once again Old Leacock opens its doors for our monthly community hymn sing, the first Sunday of each month May through September, at 7:00 p.m.


Join us for an hour of heartfelt song—your choice—and then enjoy lemonade in the courtyard.

To meet our budget, we need to receive an average of \$4,363 each week. There were four Sundays in April, and we would have liked to see $4,363 \times 4$ or 17,452 received in offering for April. We received a total of \$15,869 for April, which means we are 17,452 - 15,869 = 1,583 behind our 17,452 -

As far as our actual expenditure versus offering, we are also tracking behind. \$70,958 has been spent and we received \$65,036 in offering. That is a deficit of \$5,922.




