Notes from the Manse

I remember back when I was a teenager stumbling upon the famous quote by Hemingway—"What is the definition of guts? Grace under pressure." Well, that impressed me. There I was trying to sort out who I was, trying to deal with all the uncertainties of adolescence, and this sounded like something to aspire to. Now, of course, since it was Hemingway who said this I thought the whole deal was a tough guy kind of thing, one of those heroes of his who calmly smoked a cigarette and reassured a weeping woman shortly after he had lost his arm. And in a way that is what guts is all about. Think of the soldier who moves through a quiet street in a foreign country not knowing when there may be a bomb ready to go off, a sniper lining up a shot. Or think of the firefighter who breaks down a door and enters a house in flames, or a trooper walking up to a car pulled over for speeding with always the possibility there's a gun waiting for him or her. Think of them, staying calm even as their heart races, keeping their thoughts on what they have to do and not their fears, staying true to their comrades. That's guts.

But I believe there is another kind of guts that sometimes can be even harder to have. Though he probably didn't intend it, I think Hemingway was on to something—guts, true courage, is grace under pressure, the kind of grace in which we believe in our faith, the grace shown us in our Lord Jesus Christ. It's hard under the best of circumstances to be gracious. Even in the good times, we can get so caught up in the busy race of our lives that we forget to smile, to say thank you, to see the good and not the bad in others. And it's, oh, so much harder to be gracious when we hurt, when we are sick, when our lives seem to be crumbling around us. Yet it does happen; people do do it; people do show grace under pressure.

When I was a new chaplain in an inner city hospital in Bridgeport, CT, the work at times could feel overwhelming. For here I was, called upon to care for people often so sick, so frightened, to care too for their families who were every bit as afraid and uncertain. Where would I find the words to say? What could I do or offer? But still I had to find a way to be there for these folks. So I prayed, and I prayed with them, and I tried as best I could to open myself so the Spirit could lead me. Some folks frankly could have cared less that a chaplain came by. Others seemed deeply grateful. There was one woman, who had an illness that would probably never go away. When I stopped by to see her, she urged me to sit down. And before I could offer much of anything, she was asking me how I was. When I seemed kind of puzzled and said that really it was more important how she was doing, she said, no, she was OK; she was concerned about me. Later, when she was discharged, for there was nothing more they could do for her, she sent me a card telling me she was thinking of me. Well, I've never forgotten her. She was so sick, but, yes, she had guts; she embodied the grace of our Lord, she shared that grace, even when she was facing very real troubles, very real pressure. Paul says in I Corinthians 16, "Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love." Yes, we do need courage; we do need to be strong. But it doesn't have to be a macho kind of thing. For we are to be strong in love. We are to have grace under pressure, the giving, serving grace of our Lord.

To meet our budget, we need to receive an average of \$4,363 each week. There were four Sundays in September, and we would have liked to see $$4,363 \times 4$ or \$17,452 received in offering for the month. That makes us \$17,452 - \$14,285 = \$3,167 behind in offering to plan, for September. When looking at the year to date (Jan - Sep) we are \$23,025 behind offering to budget expectations.

As far as our *actual* expenditure versus offering, \$150,428 has been spent and we received \$147,141 in offering. That makes our deficit \$3,287 for the year to date. No doubt, we are doing better than the last two years, but still operating at a deficit, which I still hope will be wiped away these last few months of the year!

On a positive note, looking at the year to date offering in 2014 versus 2013, we are ahead of last year at this point by \$5,777.

It's that time again - please start thinking of ideas to fill baskets to sell at the Christmas Bazaar on Saturday, December 6.





Our next book will be *Little* Bee by Christopher Cleave, a


story of the intersecting lives of a Nigerian orphan and an English woman. We will meet on Sunday January 18th at 5:00 p.m. for pizza and the discussion.
