Notes from the Manse

"All things bright and beautiful, all creatures great and small, all things wise and wonderful, the Lord God made them all." —Cecil Alexander

As I write this, it is the week of Earth Day. Now, it's true, as Skip Brackbill said last Sunday, that really every day is or should be Earth Day. But it is good to have a day set aside so that we can reflect, from all our different perspectives, on God's good creation. Usually, I begin my Notes with a quote from Scripture. But this time, I was moved instead to quote a hymn—and there were so many to choose from. Just think of "God of the Sparrow," "Praise Ye the Lord, the Almighty," "Let All Things Now Living," to name a few. And these hymns aren't some departure from Scripture. No, in fact, "All Things Bright and Beautiful" echoes *Psalm 104*, which, in v. 27, says, "O Lord how manifold are your works! In wisdom you made them all; the earth is full of your creatures." We believe in a Creator who created this and all worlds and pronounced them good. So, yes, it is fitting we stop at least one day and consider creation.

If we do, this in turn brings our attention to the Creator and kind of calls for a response. Most of you know how much I revere Francis of Assisi and many probably have heard how he preached to the birds. But did you know the content of that sermon? It was to urge the birds to sing out in praise to their Creator, grateful for their song and bright colors. And later, not too long before he died, Francis wrote a poem we've turned into a hymn and that begins "All creatures of our Lord and King, lift up your voice and with us sing, Alleluia! Alleluia!" Sun, moon, earth—all are to sing praises. And we understand what he was saying, don't we? For some, it comes in birding, waiting, looking for, a flash of beauty. For others, it comes watching snow fall, listening to the rain, looking for the first bud of the year. I knew a guy whose wife told me that he couldn't hit the broadside of a barn, that half the time he'd forget he had his rifle, that really he went out just to sit in a blind and watch the woods around him. There's that great feeling of standing on a mountaintop, with half the pleasure coming from the journey there.

But there is a problem. Paul, in *Romans 8*, speaks of creation groaning, subject to futility and decay, longing for the revealing of the children of God. God's creation is hurting, and all the creatures in it. And we, we should care. In truth, we are called to do something about it. Consider the verse in *Genesis 2* that says Adam was put in the garden to till and keep it. The Hebrew words for "till" and "keep" can also mean to serve and preserve. We are to be God's caretakers, stewards of creation. And if you look at the hymns I've quoted and think of the verse from *Psalm 104*, you'll notice the word "all." All, the psalm later says, look to the Lord for food, for the breath of life itself. And that "all" refers to all creatures, including us. Before God, we are all one; before God, we are sisters and brothers, and we are called by our Lord to love and care for our sisters and brothers. So, let us resolve on the occasion of this year's Earth Day to value creation, to remember whose it is, and to help heal it. For if we do, we will heal ourselves. And we will be reminded of what another hymn says—"For the beauty of the earth, for the glory of the skies, for the love which from our birth over and around us lies: Lord of all, to thee we raise this our hymn of grateful praise."

Read the words to the hymn, and during our continuing Eastertide may you reflect on the truth the resurrection gives us and may your faith be strengthened. Let us sing with great joy!

The Session and Trustees met together in April to share information about the work of each board. The Trustees are working hard to prioritize projects which continue to come to their attention: repaving/repairing the parking lot, replacing the H-VAC unit in the choir room area, replacing the manse furnace, trimming large trees on the property, fixing a

leak in the elevator. As stewards of our finances and property, the Trustees are consistently aware of physical plant needs and limited monetary resources and strive to maintain a balance between both.

tory.

ground checks for volunteers and staff working with children as required by the new PA law.


- Purchasing copies of the new directory to place in the pews at Paradise.

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Child Protection Law Update

I am sure that most of you have already heard rumblings about the new state requirements for clearances for all child care workers both professional and volunteers.

The Child Protection Task Force has been in place in our church for some time, waiting most recently on the Presbytery interpretation of State Law. We have now received this interpretation.



The Christian Ed Committee, in conjunction with the Task Force, has created a plan for our church to become compliant with State Law. The safety of our children has always been our highest priority.

We have identified approximately 50 people within our congregation, who, if we are to continue our present programs, would need to obtain clearances. Some of these people already have obtained their clearances because of their occupations.

The deadline to become compliant is June 30, 2015. The committee hopes that all in-

volved will understand the importance of this requirement and will be willing to obtain the required clearances. This will involve those who help out with children in such things as God's Place For Kids, Sunday School or Youth Group.

The Session has decided that the church will pay for the clearances, which for most people will cost a total of \$40; if anyone chooses not to be reimbursed, that will be greatly appreciated.

The Women's Assoc. has contributed \$500 towards this effort. The clearance application process is rather straight forward and can be done online.

A typed procedure has been prepared, and will be available at the back of the church by Sunday May 17, for those who have computer access and are comfortable applying for their clearances.

Dates will be announced for application sessions to be held at the church for those without computer access or who would appreciate assistance.

The 13th annual community hymn sing series, *Singspiration*, will begin on Sunday, May 3, at Old Leacock Presbyterian Church.



March was a five week month, so it looks much better than February (our bad weather month ©). This March was very close to last year in offering, but we are doing better at controlling expenses, as you see from the year to year comparison. With one quarter of the year past us, we are at a \$764 deficit of spending versus offering income. This is much better than in recent years, but still is a deficit. I know this is in the weekly bulletin, but as a reminder, we need to receive \$4,333 each week to make our budget.

As you may have seen in the bulletins of late, we are asking for the per capita payments to be made. This year's <u>per capita amount is \$32 per member</u>. The total amount we will pay to Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly in per capita is \$6,762. This is paid in quarterly installments of \$1,690.50. We have already made our first payment in January and the next will be in April. Through the end of March, we have received \$2,258 in per capita payments (Thank You!!). PLEASE check your giving envelope boxes for the per capita envelopes, put your payment in it and drop it in the offering plate this Sunday. If you won't be at Church, feel free to mail it in as well.
