Notes from the Manse

A few Sundays ago, I mentioned that we have re-entered the part of the church year known as Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time began shortly after Christmas and continued for several weeks until Lent began. Some three months then passed as we journeyed to Easter and Pentecost. So, in the early part of the year there are relatively few weeks that fall in Ordinary Time. But now we will remain in Ordinary Time all the way to Advent. And as I said before, do not think that because we call this time ordinary it is not special or important. For us, as followers of the Lord, it is if anything a critical time. It is no coincidence that its color is green, for this is intended to be a time of growth. How fitting, then, that summer has just begun, that seeds have been planted, and we can already see all around us signs of crops coming to life. Well, what about us? What seeds have been planted? How are they doing? Can we see signs of their growth?

In his teaching, Jesus often used the image of the seed. There was, for instance, the parable of the sower, with the seed representing the word of God. That word has come to us in so many ways, in church on Sunday, in lives of grace we have witnessed. Now, the seed sometimes may fall on the path and just lie there to be picked up by birds, when we don't understand what God speaks to us. Other times it may fall on rocky soil; then it will not grow, for its root is shallow and will not hold when a price must be paid for walking the way of the Lord. Other seed may be scattered among thorns, and the plant that comes will be choked out by a thirst for things or all the distractions, all the daily concerns, big and small, of mortal life. These are the dangers when seed is scattered; this is what happens to God's good word when it comes to a broken world.


Let us, instead, strive to be good soil so that the seed may thrive. What does that mean? Well, it means we have open hearts and minds, listening for what God is saying and not what we expect or want to hear. We must be humble enough to sit with God's word, so that we may understand what the Lord is saying to us today. We must be willing to carry our own crosses, to do the things that God wills even if others then reject us, scorn us, hurt us. We must be willing to shift our priorities, to make the ways of the Lord our true treasure, the treasure of our heart, and not the passing treasures of this world.

There's more. In *John*, Jesus says that a grain of wheat must die if it is to bear much fruit. With Jesus, the Kingdom of God has begun to break into the world. This I do believe. But like a plant, it is still growing. And sometimes, some dying must occur for life to come. Last week, nine people were killed at a Bible study in Charleston, SC; that was a dying that should never have happened. The victims were not strangers. They were part of the body of Christ; they were our sisters and brothers. And so surely a part of us died as well. Life can be hard; it can break our hearts. But still the seeds within us can grow, fertilized with sorrow and pain. We can be good soil for the word and will of God, imperfect as we may be. We just need to water the seeds with love, forgiveness, and grace, as the relatives of the victims in Charleston are doing. So, yes, this is Ordinary Time. Let it be our time of growth in the Spirit.

THE MISSION COMMITTEE

The Mission Committee is continuing to serve a free community meal with the help of our giving congregation. The July meal will be held on Thursday, July 30th, and the August meal on August 27th.

At our last meeting we discussed and decided where to disperse the "souper bowl" offering. The total for that offering was \$303 of which 1) \$150 to be given to St. John's Church to help support their free Christmas Dinner project, 2) \$75 to the Factory for their summer meal/swim project, and 3) \$78 to the Water Street Rescue Mission.

At our next meeting we will be discussing where to disperse our Pentecost offering which was \$470. Of that we should keep 25% or \$117.50. Alison Shirk: Daughter of John and Kris Shirk, graduated from Lampeter-Strasburg High School and plans to attend Kutztown University for Software Development.






May's offering beat last May by \$1,899, which is a positive statistic, as well as being greater than the expenses for this May by \$2,773. As of the end of April, we were \$4,134 behind in offering versus expenses year to date, but after May, we are now only behind \$1,261 because of the lower requirements of spending in May.

This year's per capita amount is \$32 per member. The total amount we will pay to Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly in per capita is \$6,762. This is paid in quarterly installments of \$1,690.50. We have already made our first two payments, totaling \$3,381. Through the end of April, we have received \$2,521 in per capita payments (Thank You!!). But we have paid out MORE than we have received. PLEASE check your giving envelope boxes for the per capita envelopes, put your payment in it and drop it in the offering plate this Sunday. If you won't be at Church, feel free to mail it in as well.
