# Notes from the Manse

Soon, the seasons will again be changing. The nights are growing a little longer; the days are a bit cooler. All around us we see signs of the beginnings of harvest time— what a blessing it is to live in this area surrounded by such bounty! Now, I am sure there are more than a few kids who probably would like to see the summer linger, for there is that matter of a new school year. But I think they will learn that the rhythm of the seasons is a good thing, that, as *Ecclesiastes* taught, there is a time for every matter under heaven.

Still, before we leave one season for another it is good to reflect on what has happened, where we have been and what we have done. It can be so easy in this increasingly fast-paced world in which we live to race on to the next thing so quickly that we forget the good of what we have had. Think about it. Do you remember your history grade in 9<sup>th</sup> grade or how much you had in your bank account seven years ago? Probably not. We spend a lot of time with facts and figures; we can become addicted to trying to measure our lives. But all that we tend to forget. What we do remember are stories. *Matthew 13* says that Jesus told those who followed him many things in parables. Well, why? Take for instance the Parable of the Good Samaritan. A lawyer had asked Jesus what he had to do to inherit eternal life. He was probably hoping for a simple list, a clear code of behavior that he could strive to follow. Jesus instead spoke of love, of loving God and neighbor. Now this wasn't all that clear—who, the lawyer wanted to know, was his neighbor? Jesus could have given a nice, well-organized lecture on the philosophical and ethical value of caring for people different than us. But he didn't. He told a story, a story of love without expectation of return, love for what amounted to an enemy. And we remember that story so much better than we would have a lecture.

So, let us take the time now to think of what have been our stories this summer. What were those moments shared with others that touched you, perhaps changed you? Were there times you were alone and something in God's good creation moved you, gave you a sense of yourself, a sense of God, you might not have had before? Did you witness somebody do even a simple thing that helped you see that person in a new light? Don't let those moments slip away—they are what build a life.

And one more thing. In a few weeks, on September 13<sup>th</sup>, we will be celebrating Leacock's 275<sup>th</sup> anniversary. I would appreciate it if you would do me a favor. I have been spending a fair amount of time looking through what I can find about Leacock's history. We have a fine little booklet covering from 1740-1976. But much of it has to do with pastors and building improvement and formation of committees. All that is good, but what I was looking for were the stories of the people of the church, for those stories are what make a church. So, think back over your years at Leacock, whether you have been a member for a long or short time. What are the stories that come to mind, stories of grace, of times that made all the difference? Remember them, and if you will, share them with me. Write me a note; give me a call. For it is in those stories that we witness the Spirit blowing through our lives, the presence of the God of history amongst us.

# <u>A Boy Named Stanley</u> (Mission Committee)

We would like to introduce you to a little 5-year-old boy named Stanley Washington, Jr. He lives in a village of Papua, New Guinea where, as many of you know, our congregation has sponsored a missionary couple, the Farrs, through Wycliffe Bible Translators.

The Farrs have spent many years in Papua, New Guinea translating the New Testament into the Korafe language so the people can read of God's love in their own language. They have accomplished this and are now working on the Old Testament.

Jim Farr has relayed to us the plight of one young boy and his family. One of the native villagers helping with the translating is Stanley Washington, Sr. He noticed that his son, Stanley, Jr. was struggling physically to keep up with other children when playing. Stanley, Jr. became short of breath and extremely tired. A doctor was scheduled to visit their village to do immunizations and checkups. Stanley took his son to the clinic to be seen by the doctor. The doctor's report was not good.

Since no other testing equipment was available, the doctor used his stethoscope and detected that Stanley, Jr. had serious heart problems. However, he couldn't determine exactly what they were. His initial feeling was that substantial surgery would be needed for a cure.

Unfortunately, the only hospital that can handle major heart surgery is in the capital, Port Moresby. This would mean a trip to the provincial capital, Popondetta, to catch a plane to Port Moresby, staying with someone for a week to a month, paying hospital copays, and then reversing the process. This would be just the first step to get a definitive diagnosis.

If the right doctor can be found in Port Moresby, the surgery might be done there. If not, then a trip to Australia would be necessary. As you can see, this is quite a complicated situation.

The Session of Leacock has approved our giving a "love gift" to Stanley and his family. A container for your contributions will be placed in the back of Old Leacock Church and in the Narthex at the Paradise Church. The containers will be in place for six months until the end of January 2016. The money collected will be sent to help defray medical and travel expenses for Stanley and his family. In January, the situation will be revisited to see if more help is needed.

An initial amount of \$700 has already been sent. Unfortunately, that doesn't even cover transportation to Port Moresby.

We are asking the congregation for help. Just put a few pennies away each day, or empty your pockets of change on Sunday mornings...every little bit helps.


Please prayerfully consider this mission project—we have the privilege to help save a little 5year-old boy's life. Thank you.

When last we looked at the church finances, it was for the month of May and at the end of May, we were only \$1,261 behind in offering versus expenditures. Not wonderful, but also not too bad, as we had enough in the church's account to absorb that amount of deficit. Looking at June and July, we see a much different picture because of unusually low offering amounts.

Now, at the end of July, we are **\$10,574 BEHIND** in offering versus expenditure. Expenditures include paying our employees, paying taxes, paying for utilities etc...Things I would not consider discretionary spending, but very much required. Any spending that can be controlled to a minimum is being controlled. The bottom line is we need more offering to continue to be able to operate normally. Please, please consider whatever you could do to help out more during this time. Your church needs your financial support now, more than ever. Thank you so very much!

### Gratitude Corner (Those Who Go Above and Beyond to Care for their Minister and His Wife)



#### A New Year and a New Time for our Sunday School Children


