Notes from the Manse

"For the kingdom of God is not food and drink but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit."—Romans 14:17

That's a remarkable statement. I mean, if someone had asked you to tell them what the kingdom of God is what would first come to your mind? Maybe righteousness, sure; maybe the Lord in his glory, reigning at the right hand of God. Or maybe you'd think about justice finally come to a world so often unjust. And maybe peace would occur to you as well. But joy? Why, isn't faith supposed to be a serious thing? Aren't people, when talking about faith, supposed to lower their voices and maybe even frown a bit? All too often, in the history of the church, joy has at best been a kind of afterthought. Oh, people might speak of joy in the Lord, or the joy of thinking of God's grace and the cost that came with it (often with a tear in the eye). But that tended to be a kind of abstract joy. What about good, old joy right here and now? What would be so very wrong about putting all our worries and gripes aside when we came to church and smiling, maybe even laughing, dancing?

Recently, a member of the church commented on the fact that there is joy to be found at Leacock and that she wanted to embrace that joy. I guess she must have been reading Paul. Or maybe she was just on to something. Because, you know, there is a lot to be joyful about in our fellowship. So much work each month is put into offering a meal to our neighbors; we open the doors of the old church for five months of the year so that folks can sing out their favorite hymns. Do we get anything from these things, like new members or money? Maybe a little. But that's not what it is about. It's about offering gifts. And what we do gain is joy—just ask those involved in the Community Meal or the Hymn Sings. Or take some time and watch the kids get really excited about going to Sunday School or Youth Group and crushed when time's up or one or the other isn't being held that week. There's joy in those kids and in those working with them. And then there are all the people, the volunteers, who serve on committees and do the work of this church often without notice or thanks. I can tell you, they bring me great joy.

Life, of course, isn't always easy, and it can seem some time like joy's a pretty hard thing to find. But there's Paul again in *I Thessalonians* calling us to be joyful always. And Jesus, in *Luke*, said that when people hate or revile us we are to rejoice, to leap for joy, for our reward will be great in heaven. But we don't have to wait that long. Next time someone is mean or snarky to you, step back, remember those other people who have been kind; you'll find joy past the hurt. Many of us felt joy recently at our 275th Anniversary celebration. Well, think of all the trials that came in those 275 years. Think of other times when the denomination and most likely the church was divided. There were probably times of fear and even anger. But I bet there still was joy and that it was that joy that sustained the church. Fear and anxiety don't tend to do the trick. The angels at Jesus' birth told the shepherds not to be afraid for they were bringing news of great joy. That joy has never left. So, let us resolve amidst all our challenges and disagreements to rejoice in our church and each other. Our joy will make God glad. And if anything will carry us into the future, it will be that joy.

Offering \$123,109 - Expenses \$127,344 = \$4,235

We have a brighter August financially speaking than the low months of June & July.

At the end of July, we were \$10,574 BEHIND in offering versus expenditure, a significant deficit.

The offering which was stronger in August, coupled with lower than average expenditures has helped our situation significantly. As of the end of August, we are now \$4,235 BEHIND. Looking back to last year, by the end of August 2014, we had \$135,000 in offering year-to-date. It is a shame we could not have received offering at the pace and amounts as in 2014, because if we did, there would be a small surplus versus the deficit we are facing now.

Typical expenditures include paying our employees, paying taxes, paying for utilities etc... Things I would not consider discretionary spending, but very much required. Any spending that can be controlled to a minimum is being controlled. The bottom line is we need more offering to continue to be able to operate normally.

Please, please consider whatever you could do to help out more during this time. Your church needs your financial support now, more than ever. Thank you so very much!

A special thank you to Karen Homsher and Bonnie Rice, the "Kitchen Committee Ladies" for helping me get those necessary jobs done.





HOW IS STANLEY?

Our little five year old Stanley needs heart surgery badly. He has seen the pediatric cardiologist in Port Moresby and the necessary testing has been completed. His final diagnosis is "tetralogy of fallot"

This is a congenital condition which involves four major heart defects: 1) a hole in the heart between two major chambers; 2) an overriding aorta, which means that his main artery is receiving blood from both major chambers instead of just the left side as is normal; 3) pulmonary stenosis- a very tight valve leading out from the right side of the heart- in his case this is very severe; 4) right ventricular hypertrophy which is an overgrowth of the right heart muscle.

In Stanley's case he is symptomatically very severe. Without intervening surgery, he will

die. However with the surgery he most likely has a very good chance of living a normal life.

They have applied for aid for the surgery from "Children First" and have been accepted, which is already an answer to prayer. "Children First" will fund the surgery. However Stanley and one parent must travel to India and have the operation done there. All this requires birth certificates, photo ID's, passports, signatures of public officials who have known the applicants for three years, and a thumbprint.

Photo ID's can only be gotten in person at Port Moresby, the capital. Because virtually none of this can be done by mail, it will mean more travel for Stanley and his parents. As of this writing, it is hoped that everything can be completed and that Stanley and his Dad can be on their way by early December.

Please remember our jar for the "love gift" to help with all the travel and other expenses they will have. You may also send donations to the church. Just mark the check for "benevolence fund" and put the

name Stanley Siri on the bottom of the check. Checks may also be sent to Lois Eshleman at 230 Longfellow Dr. Lancaster, PA 17602.

And please keep Stanley and his family in your prayers as they embark on this journey of faith.




