Notes From the Manse

It has been almost two weeks since Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. Like so many traditions of our faith, Lent, for many, has lost its true significance. It's good to remember where it all began, with Jesus in the wilderness tempted by the devil. Jesus was led there by the Holy Spirit and it appears he saw it as a time for contemplation and prayer. When he left the wilderness, he began his ministry, the journey of grace that led him in time to Jerusalem and the cross that there awaited him. So his wilderness days were a time of preparation. Lent is supposed to be a time of preparation for us as well. It's a sad thing, but too often we miss the meaning of Easter; we take for granted what God did for us in Jesus Christ. People seek consolation, reassurance in faith, and that is good. But you cannot get to Easter from Palm Sunday without passing through Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. If you try, Easter is cheapened. That's why I am always a little sad when I see how few people attend Maundy Thursday and Good Friday and Good Friday services.

In Lent, we need to turn to ourselves, each of us individually, for a little honest soul searching. We need to remind ourselves why we need Easter, why we need grace. Now, *Matthew* says that Jesus fasted in his 40 days in the wilderness. That's where we get the idea of giving something up for Lent. But I think it's worth asking what kind of fast we should do. In *Isaiah 58*, the Lord speaks of the fast that he chooses and the fast he does not want. There and in *Matthew* it appears that the Lord doesn't want dramatic displays of false humility. And I rather doubt that what he's after is merely giving up chocolate or midday snacks, though they can serve as reminders of something bigger.

So what is the fast the Lord chooses? Well, from *Isaiah*, it does appear we are to give up some things. We are to give up our selfishness; the way we beat others down; our endless talent for quarreling; the way we're so quick to point the finger, to blame others; the casual urge to speak ill of our sisters and brothers. I usually give up meat for Lent, and that is fine as far as it goes. It's a discipline. But really, I think God kind of wants me to give up some more important things, all the big and little ways I contribute to human division and brokenness. The Lord doesn't stop there in *Isaiah*; he makes it clear the fast he chooses involves taking things on, not only giving things up. Look at what the Lord asks us to take on in *Isaiah*: the courage to work for justice, to free the imprisoned; not only to write a check to a charity, but rather share our bread with the hungry, bring the homeless poor into our houses, to cover the naked. We are to be present, fully present, for all of our kin, who, Jesus taught us, includes everybody.

That's the fast the Lord chooses. It's not easy. To give up all our hurting, broken ways is so much against our human grain. To stop in our busy lives to care for, to offer ourselves fully to our neighbor, the neighbors we find wounded on the side of the road, to let our guard down to let others into our lives, even those who are different from us, whom we don't like—all that costs. Yet, that is what the Lord wants. Let us this Lent look at ourselves. Can we, will we give up what we should? Will we take on what the world needs. The answers may be sobering. They will be our preparation for grace.



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


Worship at Leacock

For 2016, we have set a budget of \$224,267. To meet our budget, we need to receive an average of \$4,313 each week. For January, we didn't quite reach this. We received \$15,132 versus the hopeful \$21,565 needed to keep on track with our budget. January was a five Sunday month, but there was that little matter of a blizzard on the weekend of Jan 24th! So not completely surprising that we are not closer. When we compare our expenses of \$13,280 to the offering income of \$15,132, we see however, we still received \$1,852 more than we spent for the month.

As you may have seen in the bulletins of late, we are asking for the per capita payments to be made. This year's per capita amount is \$32.27 **per member**. The total amount we will pay to Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly in per capita is \$6,841.24. This is paid in quarterly installments of \$1,710.31. We have already made our first payment in January. Through the end of January, we have received \$2,135.32 in per capita payments. PLEASE check your giving envelope boxes for the per capita envelopes, put your payment in it and drop it in the offering plate this Sunday. If you won't be at church, feel free to mail it in as well!


