### Notes from the Manse

I feel good! Yes, I know that is a line from an old R&B song. But that's not what brought this feeling. No, I feel good because of the All-Congregation retreat that happened yesterday. It wasn't perfect. There were things that could have been better. For instance, it was pointed out that my handwriting isn't exactly the best. But think about it. Why was that noticed? Because I was racing to write down a long list of what is bread, what is good about Leacock. So, I can live with a not-so-good handwriting. Or take attendance. There were folks missing, and they were missed. But oh, my, how gratifying it was to see how many did come, how many brought wonderful food, how much laughter we shared. Why, the food was so good that some folks suggested that we gather the recipes and publish them. There were so many people who, as always, worked behind the scenes to pull off not only this retreat, but also the two that preceded it. There was Erin Cox-Holmes, our presbytery's executive presbyter, who led us so ably. There were those who stayed after to clean up and rearrange tables for this week's Community Meal. I could go on. But you get the point—I feel good.

Oh, the good of yesterday doesn't mean that we still don't face challenges. Of course we do—that goes with being human. But I was struck by part of the message of the video we watched. In it, the speaker suggested that because of our primeval roots we are hardwired in our brains to be anxious, to worry, to be negative. He observed that if ten things happen in a day, five good, four neutral, and one bad, we tend to remember the bad. But, he said, we can change this; we can change the very way our brains work. When good things happen, if we hold on to them, if we take the time to pause and reflect on what is good, the good, the positive will remain with us. And in time, slowly but surely, our brains will become more prone to being positive rather than negative. Even his diagrams reflected that. There were many red, negative dots in our brains' container, but the green, positive ones were bigger. And he suggested that if, when we hold onto the good, we link it to some of the bad, we will see the bad in a different way. We may be able to make it good. At the very least, it will have less of a hold on us.

In *1 Thessalonians*, Paul urges us to "hold fast to what is good." Now, you might say that he is referring to good behavior, and you would probably be right. But just a few verses earlier, he says that we should rejoice always, that that is the will of God in Christ Jesus. So, I don't know. Maybe that guy in the video wasn't saying anything new. Maybe Paul said the same thing long ago, that we should hold onto the good, concentrate on it and not the bad, and we will be transformed. I read a book recently in which the author said that we should learn to be content with a simple truth—that we are incomplete, unfinished. And we should not judge, either ourselves or others, for everything is incomplete, everything and everyone is trying their best to grow in the midst of love and fear. So, let's not fix on what another person hasn't done or done in the way we like it. Let us not focus on what is lacking in a situation. Let us see the good and hold it, let it find a place in our hearts and minds. It just might do us and those around us some good. After all, *Proverbs* teaches that a cheerful heart is good medicine.

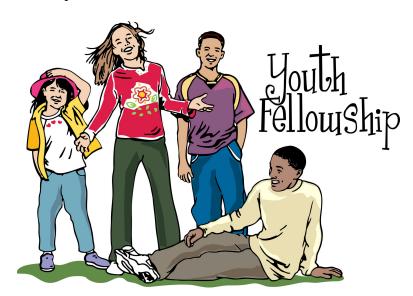
# CAMP SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE
