Notes from the Manse

Donald Trump. Hillary Clinton. There—that probably got your attention, probably for unfortunate reasons. We are in an election year. It's only natural and good that there be lively debate, for we are citizens and we are called to care about the issues. But still, I think we are to care for each other as well. Just the other day, a member of the church looked at me sadly and asked what has gone wrong in our country. She remembered the weeks after 9/11 when the whole country seemed to come together. Then, she had hoped that it would last, that we would grow as a nation. But all too soon that unity faded away, replaced by ever more partisanship, ever more division.

I believe that this not only sorrows the woman who spoke to me—it sorrows the heart of God. In his prayer just before his passion, Jesus said, "And now I am no longer in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one." I know that this specifically refers to all who follow Jesus. But I think God wills that it also apply to all our families, be they in our nation, our towns, our homes or our churches. If we are to be the light of the world, then surely we are to work so that all people be one. This does not mean that there won't be differences between us. Of course there will be and that is good, for as I said the other Sunday, it is through learning from our differences that we grow. To be one means to be together, across all our differences. How can this happen? The answer, as it always is, is love. Remember Paul's words in *1 Corinthians*—"Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful...." What healing there would be if we could live this way in all our fellowships! My college was Quaker and all decisions were by consensus. This didn't mean that everybody had to agree with everything. There always were going to be parts of a decision that some folks wouldn't like. But what it did mean is that in the end we would all accept the decision. We would stay in fellowship across our differences.

This does happen. Just the other day, two things reminded me that it does indeed happen. Emily and I went to a community book club just getting started. The nine people there all suggested books we might read. After a bit of discussion, we agreed upon a book. It wasn't everybody's first choice; some weren't terribly keen at all. But being together was more important than getting our way and we left, glad with each other. Later that night, Emily and I were at the home of some friends. That old rule about not talking about religion or politics got broken, and there we were with almost as many different opinions about the coming election as there were people. People were passionate; don't get me wrong. But in the end, our affection for each other, our will to be in fellowship, was stronger than making a point or being right. We were patient with each other; we were kind. And none of us left that night angry or harboring resentment.


So, let us be one. Let us be a model for bridge building in a broken world. *Psalm 133* begins, "How very good it is when kindred live together in unity!" We are all kindred, brothers and sisters. Let us be one.

A WORSHIPING FAMILY

There is great good news for the future here at Leacock! Due to the unanimous vote of the Session at our June meeting, the Leacock Congregation will be able to worship as one united body for a large part of the year!

Following referral from the Session in November 2015, the Worship and Acts 16:5 Committees met separately and together to explore the possibility and process of moving to a one-service model of worship. This included looking at schedules of other area churches and those of Donegal Presbytery, seeking verbal feedback from congregants, and distributing a questionnaire to all worshipers at the all-church retreat and through the June newsletter. We also discussed finding a time sensitive to both early and late worshipers, continuing services at Old Leacock, and easing demand on our material resources and volunteer service staff. The sentiment of the Committees and the verbal and written feedback were all in favor of worshiping at one joint service for most of the year.

Comments such as these were dominant: "We can get to know everyone." "There will be more unity in our Leacock family." "We would have better communication." "It would be a more inspiring experience with more people, more voices to join in song."

Therefore, the Session has adopted the following schedules to suit our present needs:

Nine month schedule

(to begin this year on September 18th) 9:00 Fellowship Time in the Narthex 9:30 Worship (including S.S. for children) 10:45 Adult Sunday School

<u>Summer schedule</u> (1st Sunday after Pentecost through Labor Day Sunday) 8:00 Worship at Old Leacock 9:30 Worship at Paradise

Old Leacock Day (2nd Sunday in September) 9:30 worship at Old Leacock

The service in Paradise will remain consistent at the 9:30 hour to eliminate confusion.

We realize this involves change, change from comfortable routines, for some a giving up of preferences. If you have any questions, please contact a Session member or Rev. Birch, but the Spirit seems to be calling us to this change. Let us enter it with joy and faith.



MISSION COMMITTEE

Our free community meal seems to be on track with summer meals planned for July 28th and August 25th at the usual time of 5:30-6:30pm in our Smith Fellowship Hall. We continue to be fortunate in having so many of you participating in this mission. Without all of us working together, this mission would not survive.

The Presbytery of Donegal has offered us a mission challenge for "\$20.16 for 2016." The session of Leacock has voted to accept this challenge. Great things are happening in Donegal Presbytery.

They are innovating ministry through First Mobile Church, battling hunger in Columbia, PA, reaching Anglo, Latino, and Oromo populations through our congregations and fellowships, supporting outreach through Camp Donegal, growing high school students in faith through the Reality Retreat, helping congregations develop vital futures, organizing against human trafficking and violence against women, proclaiming Jesus' love and lordship throughout York, Lancaster, and Chester Counties!

So often we become so involved in our own church and community that we fail to remember that we are also part of a larger body, the Presbytery of Donegal. They are proposing, for this year of 2016, a special mission challenge to all churches of this presbytery, to help with their mission budget that is in deep trouble. If every regular worshiping member would donate an extra \$20.16 to the mission of Donegal Presbytery, all the afore mentioned projects could continue.

The hope is for 100% participation of all the churches in the presbytery. The Session has decided on the month of July, all five Sundays, to provide envelopes marked "\$20.16 for 2016, Presbytery Mission Challenge." Your donation will go to the Benevolence Treasurer who will write a check, after the last Sunday in July, to Donegal Presbytery. Please remember Christ's command to "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Your donation will be deeply appreciated.

If we look only at the above numbers we may have a false image of the giving at Leacock this year. Since January more than \$12,000 has been given to the Trustee Special Fund helping to pay the cost of a new furnace for the manse. Almost \$3,000 has been donated toward our Per Capita Apportionment for our Presbytery offering. That means that the Leacock community has given more than \$80,000 this year to help continue the work of this body of Christ in the world.

Yes, the summer months are upon us, and because of vacations offerings are usually down. Please consider how you can help Leacock during this normal summer financial slump: double your offering before you go away or as soon as you return, send your offering while you are away, praying for the community that gathers for worship (and misses you.)

Quoting Paul in 2 Corinthians 9:6: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion." Leacock is sowing bountifully; we are about a great work. Thank you.

SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS AND HELPERS


