Notes from the Manse

"God is not mocked, for you reap what you sow." Galatians 6:7

As I mentioned this last Sunday, the events that occurred in Charlottesville, VA have deeply troubled me, in so many ways. As a human being, it grieves me to see such a quick descent into anger and violence. As an American, it grieves me to see how coarse and divisive the national dialogue has become, when it is not altogether absent. As a follower of Christ, it grieves me to see how far we are still from the kingdom of grace, the kingdom of God, he announced. Yes, there were weapons brandished and used on both sides. And no, I do not embrace the tactics of the Antifa who believe that violence must be met with violence. How can I, if I claim to walk the way of the Prince of Peace, the one who called us to turn the other cheek, to love our enemies?

But there was no moral equivalency on both sides, not when protestors came brandishing swastikas, carrying Confederate flags, giving the Nazi salute. I realize that the stated reason for the protest was the removal of a statue honoring Robert E. Lee. But what did chanting "Blood and Soil," a Nazi slogan, or crying out "Sieg Heil" as the marchers passed a synagogue have to do with that statue? Someone recently made an interesting point—if she had gone thinking it was a protest about the Lee statue and heard and saw all that, she would have simply left; that wouldn't have been what she came for. And if she stayed, well, that would indicate that she was with the neo-Nazis and white supremacists. Seventy three years ago, my father landed at D-Day; how it would puzzle and grieve him to see Americans carrying the emblems of the regime he opposed.

The Bible makes it very clear—what we do, say, or even think matters. Jesus summed all the Law in the commandments to love, love God and neighbor. And he made clear in the Parable of the Good Samaritan who our neighbors are—everyone, without exception. So, yes, Paul is right—we can't mock, we can't fool God—we will reap what we sow. This line in *Galatians* comes shortly after the choice the apostle lays out for us. If we live by the flesh, we will bear its fruits. And it's interesting that over half of his list has to do with human division and its causes: enmity, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, factions, dissension, envy. But there is also the fruit of the Spirit, love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control.

So, what will we sow? If we sow the seeds of that miserable first list, we will surely reap many more Charlottesvilles. We will corrode this world; we will corrode ourselves. But imagine what we and the world would be like if instead we sowed the seeds of the Spirit. Ours would be a gentle life, filled with kindness across all human differences, a generosity toward all our sisters and brothers, regardless of their race or creed or political persuasion. Folks would take a deep breath before responding; they would honor their bonds to each other. There would be love, and with it there would be joy and at last peace. We are perhaps a long way from that world. But this I believe—we as Christians are called upon to try our hardest every day to sow those seeds, even when we get discouraged, even when we are opposed or hurt for doing so. God's kingdom will come, but still we have a work to do.

Although the past three months have seen all of us in summer mode, your Session has continued to work to lead Leacock by holding committee meetings, bringing recommendations to the body as a whole, and engaging in a six hour August Stewardship Retreat with Rev. Ellie Johns-Kelley from the Presbyterian Foundation.

Actions from the June and August meetings included the following:

- · Hiring Marsha Horst as church treasurer.
- Granting Rev. Birch vacation from August 21 September 5.
- Approving pulpit supplies Rev. Jane Busey, H.R. for August 27 and Rev. Dr. Michael Wilson, Donegal Presbytery Stated Clerk, for September 3.
- Granting Donegal Presbytery building use September 12 for a Leader Team meeting and a Leadership Summit.
- Approving a jewelry making day October 14 with Gretchen Hershey Shea.
- Consolidating all of the current treasurer positions, with the exception of the Softball Team, in the
 position of church treasurer. still keeping the accounts separate but with the treasurer administering
 them. This change will begin after the church audit in early 2018.
- Approving the spending of \$3250 from the Ministry Enhancement Fund of the Endowment Fund to repair the Old Leacock pump organ.
- Naming Darwin Eshleman to serve on the Endowment Committee.
- Approving the installation of a wireless microphone system at Old Leacock.
- Approving a Funeral/Memorial Service Plan document for distribution to the congregation later this fall.



Worship Notes



Fall Adult Sunday School Class

Following our chosen format of using a variety of lesson formats, the adult class will be using Walter Brueggemann's popular book, The Bible Makes Sense. This is a unique how-to book about the Bible. Brueggemann proposes that Christians should approach the Bible not as a collection of ancient documents, but as our partner in an ongoing dialogue about our life here and now. This book explains how to enter into this dialogue, how to listen, and how to respond. More than simply introducing you to major themes, Brueggemann reveals an engaging biblical understanding of the world that leads to a life of joy, wholeness, and peace. The class will be starting **Sept 17** in the Library.

Stewardship—Retreat Year, Retreat Sunday

Leacock's Stewardship Committee decided in January to make this a "retreat year." The idea was that committee members and any others who were interested would take a fresh look at all stewardship matters, including time, talent, and treasure, to see what is going well that we should continue and new ideas that might help us do things better. We have been in contact with the Presbyterian Foundation, specifically our area representative, Ellie Johns-Kelley. The Foundation oversees endowment investments for our church and many others in the denomination. But it also helps churches large and small address stewardship issues. In order to set aside time so that all of this could be considered thoughtfully, we decided to have a Stewardship Retreat, which we had on August 12. Ellie led the gathering, with a morning session on general issues and an afternoon one on bequests. The retreat was very well attended and those who came left with a variety of ideas to pursue.

We learned a lot that day. For one, Leacock does remarkably well in its Mission giving, nearly doubling the amount that the average church in our denomination gives as a percentage of a total budget. But clearly we can do more, better. We are currently looking at various forms of on-line giving so that people who prefer going paperless can. Further, it will help members stay current with their offerings even while away. New ways of coordinating committees that are involved in the finances of the church are also being considered, with one idea being to have the Stewardship Committee and the Trustees hold joint meetings, at least in part.

There is more we are looking at—look for other newsletter articles and presentations in worship. Overall, Ellie tried to stress that what churches are about is far more than budgets in the usual sense. As followers of Christ, we seek to cultivate a culture of generosity so that we can do two things: affirm that our ministry in Paradise is needed and in many ways unique and therefore to support it; serve others in our community and throughout the world. This, then, is our goal—let our stewardship, in all its forms, be filled with faith and joy.
