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Notes from the Manse

"A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God."—Isaiah 40:3

This verse is usually associated with John the Baptist during Advent. According to the Gospels, John did prepare for Jesus by foretelling his coming and preaching a baptism of repentance. But this verse, like so many in Scripture, can have a deeper, broader significance. And read one way, it can speak not only to Advent, but also to Lent. The season of Lent, like that of Advent, is a season of preparation. It's a shame that many have long since lost the importance of Lent, sort of acknowledging Ash Wednesday and then not really paying attention again until Palm Sunday, after which they skip right to Easter. To do so misses the heart of our faith, the incredible gift of grace that came at such a cost, a cost revealed on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. In the early church, people reflected on Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness, his time being tested, learning about himself, making choices that would make all the difference. And those people long ago thought it would be a good thing if we too spent 40 days in a wilderness, searching ourselves and why we so need grace, reflecting on all Jesus did for us in that last, lonely week of his life. Every year, on Holy Week Jesus comes again to us, comes to our hearts, offering the free gift. Surely, it would indeed be good to prepare our hearts.

Traditionally, people have fasted during Lent. Most think that means giving something up, and that can be good, especially if it is something that might linger with us long after Easter. Fasting, however, can lead us to take something on. Perhaps this Lent, you can resolve to do something that will prepare your heart for the Lord. You might read a little Scripture every day, maybe the chapters tracing Jesus' journey from Palm Sunday through Good Friday. Read only a verse or two and then sit with them; ask what they are speaking to you. Or you could look through our hymnal in the section about Christ's passion and death, hymns 196-228. Each day, pick a hymn; read the lyrics; sing the song if you can or search for it on-line or at the library. Or you could go outside; sit or take a walk. It is a hinge point between seasons. Look, listen, smell, touch, hear what God's creation is saying about life coming from death; reflect on how God is offering you new life. Another possibility would be to read a book reflecting on Christ's passion. Or you might pray, with or without words, concentrating on who Jesus is for you, now, at this point in your life. Light a candle, perhaps some incense; let him be present with you. Still another thing you might choose to do would be to help someone you know needs help, working with them on a repair or a project. Or you could get involved in work bringing justice to some of the oppressed or lost of whom Jesus so often spoke.

These are just a few suggestions; you could come up with something else that might be more meaningful for you. What's important is that whatever you choose to do you do on a regular basis. Put aside a little time each day the remainder of Lent. You might make an exception of Sunday, for traditionally each Sunday is considered a little Easter. But if you stick with it, what you do will orient you, prepare you, for Holy Week. When it comes, your heart will be open. And it will be filled, in new and deeper ways.




Our One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering will be accepted from March 4th through Easter Sunday, April 1st.

We cannot comprehend the life he calls us to, which will always be a mixture of shadow and light.

So, come. Join us in two special worship services. The first is Maundy Thursday, which this year will be March 29. We will gather at 7 p.m. in Leacock's sanctuary.
