#### **Notes from the Manse**

I don't think God is a micro-manager; never have. I know there are some who think God's hand is moving in pretty much everything, and for all I know they may be right. Maybe God was involved that day when they were in a frantic hurry and the weather was horrible and a parking space suddenly appeared near the entrance to the mall. But personally, I don't think so. Or consider more meaningful moments. The psalmist declares in *Ps 34:19, 20,* "Many are the afflictions of the righteous, but the Lord rescues them from them all./ He keeps all their bones; not one of them will be broken." Those certainly are comforting words. But what do they say to people lying in a hospital bed with a shattered leg? That they aren't righteous enough? Again, I don't think so. Sometimes, it sure seems that God isn't fixing all the details of our lives. After all, didn't Jesus, whom I think was a pretty righteous person, quote another psalm on the cross that indicated he felt forsaken by God? I read recently someone argue that God neither causes calamities nor solves every problem. Instead, we are given freedom, without which our love of God would be coerced, not freely, joyfully given. That makes sense.

Still, there are times I wonder. Some of you have heard my tale of Emily's and my recent adventure in Maine. Here is a short version: when the forecast indicated a huge snowstorm was coming, we decided to leave a day early. But the forecast changed and when it suggested there would only be an inch of snow, followed by rain, we felt it was safe to leave as we had originally planned. Before we headed out, we topped off our left front tire. For a while, it had had a slow leak that a few pounds of air would fix for a few months. Our other tires were wearing, and we wanted to replace them all. So, the morning we left, we gave the tire a bit of air, just to be sure. About an hour later, as we prepared to make a guick stop in Bangor, the warning light went on indicating the tire was low. Well, that had never happened so quickly before. There was a branch of a tire store chain nearby that fixed flats or leaks for former customers, which we were. So, we drove over. An hour later, they told us the leak was in such a place that the tire couldn't be fixed. I knew which tires we had planned to buy soon, but they did not have them in stock. Ultimately, we had to choose between buying one tire, which we would not use for long, or buy a set of snow tires. Given the milder winters in Pennsylvania, we didn't really need snow tires, but they were higher rated and so we went with them. At last, some four hours later, we got back on the road. Then it happened. The snow changed to rain all right, a freezing rain that steadily froze over our windshield and headlights, forcing me to stop twice to chip away ice so we could see. Eventually, as we went south, it got warmer and the roads were okay. But it did seem odd. If that light hadn't gone on when it did, we wouldn't have gone to the tire store; we wouldn't have gotten snow tires. We would have headed into an ice storm with a leaking tire and poor tread on the others.

Would we have made it? Maybe. Maybe not. But it sure seemed to Emily and me someone was looking after us. Was it God? I believe in a Spirit and active grace moving through our lives. But what kept us safe that day? Ultimately, I don't know. But sometimes it sure feels like God gives nudges, maybe even nudges to buy snow tires.



The amount varies with the needs of the presbytery, synod, and General Assembly, and is a regular expense payable by this church at the spring meeting of presbytery. The amount to be paid this year per communicant member is

Your Church is dedicated to supporting the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. Your per capita payment is split up between our local Presbytery, our Synod and the General Assembly. Some of these funds are used for administrative purposes, but a LARGE part of it is used for mission projects. The GA, Synod and Presbytery have different perspectives than we have on mission work given they operate at levels other than a single Church. They can identify and act upon purposes that we do not have visibility of. PLEASE place this year's amount (\$34.78) for each member in your household into the envelope and mail it to the Church or drop it into the offering plate this Sunday. If you lose the envelope, don't panic or worry, it is not magic. Any envelope will do! Just write your name(s) on it and the words "Per Capita"
