Notes from the Manse

Think for a moment—what is, perhaps, the most common symbol of our faith? There are many, sure. There are a loaf and a fish that remind us of the way the Lord feeds us. There is the mustard seed, so small, that speaks of the power of faith no matter how frail. But over the centuries, it seems the cross has held the most power over our imagination. And that would seem to have a good scriptural foundation. Paul repeatedly makes clear how central the cross was to him. In *Galatians*, he insists that he boasts only of the cross of Christ. In *1 Corinthians*, he sums up his whole message by saying that he proclaims Christ crucified. Certainly, Easter, the resurrection, was critical as well for the apostle. Later, in *1 Corinthians* he states if Christ wasn't raised, then faith is futile. But he understood that you can't get to an empty tomb except through the cross. And I agree. I understand why some like to skip from the celebration of Palm Sunday to the joy of Easter. The trouble is that if you do so, you miss the heart of our faith.

That heart is revealed on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Jesus took time to care for his friends on the last night of his life. Their response? Betrayal, desertion, denial. But still Jesus kept on, through trial to the cross and an agonizing death. What does that cross reveal? Remember that in *John*, Jesus said he gave a new commandment, to love one another as he loved us. And in case any were confused about what kind of love he meant, he also said that there was no greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. That is what the cross reveals—love, love with a cost. Love, deep, abiding love that transforms lives, always comes with a cost. I didn't always recognize it then, but when I look back at all the times my mom or dad sat up with me when I was sick or sad, so willing to sacrifice sleep so that I might, then I see love. I see love when someone stays all day with a friend who no longer remembers how to care for him- or herself. I see love when a shattered person cradles a sick or wounded animal.

Jesus made clear the importance of the cross. He said all who wanted to follow him had to take up their own cross, daily, and that if they didn't, well, they couldn't be his disciples. He wasn't saying that everyone literally had to be crucified as he was. Neither was he wishing suffering on others. But he was urging us to love, to love with a cost, as he did. You don't have to die to carry a cross. But you do have to be willing, in large and small ways, to lay down your life for your friends, for your neighbors.

When last I wrote, we were beginning Lent, a time to search our hearts, for when we have not loved well, when we have not loved at all. Now, we are approaching Holy Week. Take the time to pause past Palm Sunday and before Easter, to take a long, quiet look at the cross. What you will see there is a marker of love. Others have. Why do you think there are hymns like "My Song Is Love Unknown" or "What Wondrous Love Is This"? There is an ancient Irish poem that says, "O King of the Friday/ Whose limbs were stretched on the cross;/ O Lord who didst suffer the bruises, the wounds, the loss;/ We stretch ourselves beneath the shield of thy might;/ Some fruit from the tree of thy passion/ Fall on us this night." I hope it does, on all of us. For that fruit is love.


