#### **Notes from the Manse**

Jesus could have spoken in the language of the great Jewish scholars of his time. He could have taught with all the sophistication of a Greek philosopher. He could have, but he didn't. We don't know what happened in the years prior to his three-year ministry. But the evidence is pretty strong that he spent a lot of time listening, seeing, being with people in the simple truths of everyday life. For when he began to teach, he met people where they were. He spoke to them in their language. It is not surprising, therefore, that Jesus so often used illustrations involving the land and the work of farmers, shepherds. So it was that he used more than once the image of seeds.

Jesus would have felt right at home, I suspect, in Lancaster County, with its rich soil and farmland stretching to the horizon. At this time of year, with the earth well turned and so much green growing, a question came to me. In our lives now, is there a seed or seeds waiting, calling, to be planted? Long ago, I learned that rotating crops can be necessary for the health of the soil. Well, is it any different in our lives? It can be so easy to get stuck, to keep planting the same old seeds, doing things we know and seem safe in their familiarity. Do we contain in ourselves new seeds that would bring new life? Do our lives need a crop rotation of sorts?

"A sower went out to sow his seed...." So, Jesus began one of his parables. In his explanation of its meaning to his disciples, he says that the seed is the word of God. But the parable speaks to us too, if we choose to sow new seeds in our lives. Will we cast our seed on the hard, well-traveled path, not really committed to whatever new growth would be involved? Then, the birds will eat the seeds before anything can be begun. Or will we scatter our seed carelessly among rocks, times and places in our lives that are dry, without nourishment? Then, the seeds will only wither after at best a brief start. Or will we naively cast the seeds among thorns, not preparing for all those cares of the world, all the barbs and hurts that can distract us from doing the work of cultivation? Then, our seeds will be slowly or quickly choked to death; dreams will die.

There is another way. We can plan; we can seek to find a good time, not necessarily a perfect time, when there's enough rain and sun for growth. We can till the soil; we can carefully put our seeds in that good soil. Then, they will flourish; then they will bear fruit. Note what Jesus adds at the end of his explanation of his parable—that for seeds to grow, patient endurance is needed. And those seeds must be held in an honest, good heart. The growth of new seeds, new beginnings, do not come easily. Weeds will need to be pulled; when clouds are scarce, we will need to water the soil. We cannot rush new life. With what work we do, we must also have faith. Above all, we must hold what we are attempting in our hearts. I'm being reminded of this. Many of you know that I recently planted a little tree. And oh, I worry over it; I want so badly for it to become big and strong quickly. I hope in time it does. But for now, I must wait and trust, while doing what I can. Whatever happens, it will have been good to plant the tree, to believe in new growth. So, consider—what new seeds do you hold in you? Will you plant them?




