Pandemic

I received this poem it now seems so long ago, almost like in another lifetime. My Spiritual Director sent it to me to offer some solace in a fearful time. Look at that date on which the poem was written. It's now been some six months since we realized a world pandemic had come home, here in the community in which we live. So much has happened since. A good bit of it has only compounded the anxiety, the fear, the

grief that COVID-19 brought. We have witnessed racial unrest and voices crying for justice too long absent; we are a nation ever more divided in ways that have become increasingly toxic, cruel, certainly far from the way we are called to live by our Lord. It all wears one down. There are some who insist that they have come to terms with the new normal of the pandemic. And some of the words of the poem may now seem no longer to pertain—for instance, people are traveling more, and buying and selling have resumed for some businesses. We can hope, and we should. But we do not know the future. Just today I read one expert speak optimistically about the course of the virus, while another grimly spoke of a coming second wave.

In such a time, it is hard to plan or predict what we will be able to do next year, much less in a month. What I can tell you is that Leacock, the fellowship of which you are a part, is very much alive. There are so many behind the scenes who have worked hard all these months so that we can worship and remain connected. Through my work on the leadership council of the Presbytery, I have heard about what other churches are doing. And I can tell you, without any exaggeration, that what we have done shines. I know, for other churches have asked for details on how we have handled various situations. All of this didn't just happen. The Regathering Committee researched and deliberated to find a way to regather safely. Some of the precautions are not universally welcomed. It isn't pleasant to have to wear a mask during a worship service, to have to be socially distanced, to have no Bibles in the pews. And this doesn't even mention the absence of singing, which we all miss. But we have kept safe, thanks be to God, and so these precautions will continue, until we are sure they are no longer needed.

There's more. We are seeking to do more in the months, always safely. We are looking into a virtual bazaar—people would make or identify things they wanted to donate, take a picture, and we would put them on a well-publicized site where people could visit and buy items. The idea of Bible studies using Zoom is being explored. We are doing the annual Crop Walk. The Deacons are caring for the At-Home members above and beyond the weekly calls and notes from the Caring Connection. The Trustees are keeping up our buildings and grounds and are considering a fall workday. Your church, our church, is very much alive.

But the pandemic is still here. Times are still tough, in so many ways. But consider the words of *I Peter 1:6*, where it is said we may rejoice even though for a little while we may suffer various trials. It is in times like these that like a precious metal in fire our faith is made stronger. And in the meantime, the words of the poem still offer wisdom. Let us be humble, learn acceptance and not try to make the world something that it isn't. Let us be connected in new ways, even if at times terrifying and beautiful. Let us make a covenant with each other, as strong as one for a marriage. Let us center down. Let this trying season be a Sabbath for us, a time to pause on a threshold between what has been and what is to come.



Stewardship

The Stewardship team met in September, still using Zoom remote online meeting, mostly because all the members couldn't get together physically anyway because of location. One of these months we can hopefully sit together around a table again. Regardless, we met to work as usual. We reviewed our financial statements for July and August. I must say that because of YOUR continued support through this madness, our financial situation is solid. Granted, our expenditures are somewhat lower and we did get help from the government small business grant BUT the ongoing support from the congregation is fantastic and key to our good position.

At this time of year we are already involved in planning the next year's budget, and this year is no different. The process will be somewhat simpler, as we will basically be rolling 2020 budget into 2021. There will be some modifications of course but essentially the same. Everyone will be happy to learn the Per Capita will be the same for 2021 as it was for 2020, so no change there. We are looking intently at purchasing videography equipment to easily capture services and events in the Sanctuary. We want to possibly add live streaming to our abilities. Stewardship and Session agree, the recording and online distribution of our services will be something permanent going forward, even after any virus restrictions are lifted.

Another topic discussed was the possibility of having some sort of year end ONLINE fundraising event. This way whatever we do would be open to local communities to view and participate in. Even more important than generating an income for the Church, would be the sheer act of having an event that would involve the congregation and the community. A way to show that we are not down and out because of this virus, but still active and ready to do good work to help others. I know, time is short and there is a lot of details to work out, but we are trying. Stay tuned for more information!
