Notes from the Manse

It is with sadness that in this newsletter we must tell you that worship once again will for a time be fully remote. What this means is that we will not be having a kind of hybrid worship, in which some gather in the sanctuary on Sunday mornings, while others join us later through our website. Our services will continue to be recorded and made available to anyone with access to the internet. This was not an easy decision. As noted in our clerk's article, the Session spent almost an hour weighing all the implications of such a move. In the end, with the cases of COVID-19 increasing daily by so much, it was decided that we needed to do everything we could to keep each other safe.

I know that this will disappoint some of you. I understand, for it disappoints me too. Yes, our in-person worship has been limited—not being able to sing together has really been missed. But I still so value having people there, in the pews, sharing in worship with me. You probably have no idea how strange it can feel to lead a service in an almost empty sanctuary. And I further am so proud of how Leacock's congregation has risen to the occasion. We have had no one argue about masks or social distancing. As attendance has increased, people volunteered to go to the overflow room. We did so much, so much so well that other churches in the Presbytery have asked me about how we are doing things. But now, it appears that even all this isn't enough. And I am not alone in feeling this way. I can tell you that Dianne had a real adjustment at first playing our music in a pretty empty sanctuary in the early days of the pandemic. She loves playing with people there with her.

Selfishly, I might well have urged the Session to stay with the hybrid worship model we have had since the July 4th weekend. But our faith so clearly insists that we put aside what we want if that is needed to care for, to serve others. In the earliest church, there was a great controversy. The first followers of Jesus were Jewish, and they were reluctant to give up all they had ever known of faith. Yet, as *Acts* and *Galatians* show, Paul and Peter both were moved by the Holy Spirit to put aside what they wished so that other people, Gentiles, could most readily receive the good news of Jesus Christ. We can't even begin to imagine how hard that must have been. Judaism in many ways had defined them, especially Paul. Yet in the end, there was grace, the surrender of what they as individuals wanted so that others could be saved. Well, here we are. I might want to continue to have in-person worship. But I—we—are called to follow our Lord, to put aside ourselves, to put aside ourselves for others. If we had stayed with our in-person worship, perhaps no one would have gotten sick; blessedly, no one has so far. But if one person were to become sick with this virus, really sick, I could never forgive myself. I—we—are called to care for each other, for our neighbors, our sisters and brothers. And ultimately, that is what the Session decided we had to do in this time.

We are not alone in this. Many churches across the Presbytery have already returned to fully remote worship; some never offered in-person worship. It is hard. There is a real value in being together, and some of the sad, sad, costs of this pandemic have been loneliness and disconnection. And, of course, there are some who have not returned to the sanctuary in order to keep safe; they haven't even been able to experience the limited in-person worship we have had. Yet, they continue to join us through the recorded services. I know, because I hear from them, how much they look forward to them. And the pandemic is indeed getting worse. Just today a new mask mandate was announced.

But through Christ, in Christ, with Christ, we are stronger than this virus. The pandemic will end. Now three vaccines have shown promise. Before they become readily available, this winter may well be dark and cold. But we can still have worship that is filled with light and warmth; we are already exploring ways to do just that in our recorded services. Each month, the Session will review the question of whether worship should be hybrid or fully remote. But until we are finally fully together again, in-person, we can and we will be together in our love for each other, our caring.

Earlier I mentioned how hard it can be to do a worship service in what might seem an empty sanctuary. But that's wrong. The sanctuary is never empty, for the Spirit of the Lord is there, always. And that Spirit is there even when we worship across the miles from each other. This year, this 2020, has felt so often like a flood of challenges, a raging fire of anger and mistrust and fear. It is a broken world and we are broken people. But we do not need to concede to anger or mistrust or fear. We can meet the challenges that come. How? Because we are not alone, ever. As we enter this season of Advent, let us remember, let us take strength from, the word of the Lord as recorded by Isaiah—

"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through the fire you shall not be burned, and the flames shall not consume you."

Session Snippets

The Session has held three meetings since our last newsletter, all via Zoom. Rev. Birch has become quite adept at setting up these meetings, managing discussions, and counting votes. Elders, too, are becoming more skilled at each meeting, learning how to turn video and audio on and off. However, none of us is ready to apply for an advanced technology degree.

The usual business of the church — setting and approving a 2021 budget, approving the slate of nominees for church officers, examining the financial reports, and hearing reports from the pastor and clerk — has been carried out faithfully.

These unprecedented times, however, have called for difficult, in-depth discussions about hard issues. Acknowledging the growing spread of the coronavirus, elders decided to cancel our traditional Thanksgiving Eve service and both in-person Christmas Eve services. We also scheduled Communion for the first Sunday in Advent, November 29.

The most difficult decision for your Session revolved around whether to continue our hybrid worship or return to a fully remote format. Thoughtful, insightful, faith-filled comments were exchanged as we worked toward a decision. After nearly an hour, the motion to go fully remote beginning December 6 with the Session reexamining the decision for remote worship on a monthly basis was passed.

Your Session asks for your prayers for wisdom and discernment as we move forward.
