Notes from the Manse

On May 2nd, we will again regather in person for worship, at Old Leacock and Paradise. I have heard from so many of you about how excited you are, how good it will be to see friends, neighbors, to be present in the old, familiar way with each other. It was disappointing, to be sure, that the regathering didn't happen earlier. I, for one, was deeply saddened that we couldn't be in the sanctuary together on Easter and I know I was not the only one. But still, there is such a sense of relief that our time apart is ending. It just feels like we have gotten through a long, hard ordeal, that we have been freed at last.

That is true. It is a reason to rejoice. But there is still more to do. I hope, I believe, that we are through the worst of the pandemic, but we are not yet free of COVID-19. In recent weeks, cases went up again, as did deaths, and hospitals spoke of once again being stretched by the virus. There are new variants threatening; the upper Midwest is seeing a staggering number of infections. We therefore must continue to care for each other, to do everything we can to keep people safe, following safe practices, erring on the side of caution when we are not sure of the danger before us.

Many of us, I am sure, do not want to hear that. "If we have somehow made it through this last, horrible year, why can we not put all the worry, the precautions, behind us and get back to normal?" some might ask. "I thought we were free at last." If you have such thoughts, you are not alone. The Israelites long ago felt just the same. Slavery, grinding, killing work, being far from anything one might call home—it was enough to end hope. But the Lord saw; the Lord sent Moses to let the people go, and they were brought out of the land of Egypt; they were freed. But passing through the waters turned out to be only a beginning. Oh, they were heading to a promised land, but they would not get there for 40 years. And so the people became impatient, not only over those long decades in the wilderness—why, they couldn't wait while Moses was up the mountain with the Lord. They complained and complained, demanding food, water. In the days of slavery, they hadn't lacked such things! When they had to wait, they made other gods, gods easier to understand, golden calves. And they got angry, at Moses, at God, at each other.

What they didn't realize was that those 40 years were to be a time of learning so much they had never known before. They were to love God, of course; but they were also to love their neighbors as themselves. And their care was to extend not only to friends and family, but also to the stranger amongst them, to the land itself. Really, in the end, it was all about caring, caring for each other, all others. In *Deuteronomy* 30, the Lord gives the people a choice, to choose God, which will bring life and blessing, or to choose idols that bring only death and curses. To choose God, to choose life, is the way of caring.

We too have passed through some waters, but we too have a ways to go before we reach the promised land. Let us rejoice in the progress we have already made. But let us be patient - with precautions still to follow and with each other. Let us help each other along the rest of our journey together.
