## **Session Snippets**

Your Session gathered after worship July 24 to begin delving into what we need to know and do as we move forward in the Pastoral Search Process. Before we can call a new pastor, we must know who we are and where we want to go as a church. Often this is called developing a Vision.

After much discussion, we appointed two subcommittees to study crucial issues facing Leacock. The first — Dianne Yuninger, Lois Eshleman, Angela Killian, and Rev. Shuler — will begin revision of Leacock's Mission Statement, examine the current size of our Boards to determine if this number is sustainable, identify tasks needing completion as we move toward establishing a Pastoral Nominating Committee, and establish a timeline for task completion.

The second subcommittee — Steven Boas, Skip Brackbill, Dave Berkhimer, Carol Shearer, and Rev. Shiler — is charged with examining all financial aspects of Leacock, including patterns of giving, sources of giving, Special Fund uses, the Endowment Fund, and other issues as they arise. Both groups will report their findings to the Session for further action.

The Session also voted to empower the Trustees to move forward with manse renovation and then rent the property using a local realtor as the broker.

The 2022 Church Nominating Committee has been entrusted to formulate a seven member slate for the Pastor Nominating Committee. This slate will be reported to the Session and brought to the congregation for approval.

We also approved the following items:

The Gap Male Chorus presenting a concert Sunday evening October 2 at 7:00 p.m.

The Session meets again August 18 with Donegal Presbytery Executive Presbyter Dr. Erin Cox-Holmes to explore next steps.
