

#### A WORD FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Members and Friends,

Our Lenten journey continues! This monthly newsletter heightens our awareness of who we are and what our church can mean to those around us as well as those within. I hope this message finds you well.

On Sunday mornings we continue to explore the theme "The Depths of Love: God Draws Near." From the ways God's Spirit was present with Jesus at the beginning of his ministry to his final days, we will explore aspects of his journey each week to gain insight for our own journeys.

With the Spirit's compelling, we seek to embrace the ups and downs of our lives and those of the church. The same Spirit that took Jesus to the water's edge for his baptism, drove him into the wilderness, then directed him outward to a challenging public ministry is the same Spirit that leads us.

The season of Lent can also be a time of renewal and commitment. Throughout the journey of forty days we can re-examine what is most important in our lives.

"Depths of Love" reminds me of an article entitled "The Urgency of Loving Others." This article offers a look into the life and teachings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German pastor who died in a concentration camp—executed, along with other conspirators, because of their failed plan to assassinate Adolf Hitler. Sadly he was only 39 years old, but his ideas and theology continue to shape both the church and the world in profound ways.

In the article there are parallels between Bonhoeffer's era and our current times. With a presidential election year before us, we find ourselves at a crossroads where our choices, both individually and collectively, will shape the course of history. Will we learn from the past, embracing the way of love and empathy championed by Bonhoeffer, or will we repeat the mistakes of dehumanization and division?

As we recognize our own humanity, we must continue to strive for justice, embrace our neighbors, and build bridges of understanding even when faced with challenges. I invite you to read the full article, which can be found here: https://faithlead.org/blog/the-urgency-of-loving-others/

#### **OUR LENTEN STUDY - The Seven "I Am" Statements of Jesus**

THE LENTEN SEASON began Wednesday, February 14th with ashes offered on the parking lot from 11am through the afternoon and culminating with an indoor service at 7:00pm. This was both for you and the community as well as ashes offered following Sunday morning worship on the 18th.

This season we will again intertwine Sunday morning worship with an Evening Study entitled:

"The 'I Am' Sayings of Jesus"

Join us Upcoming Sundays: March 3, 10, and 17 - 5:30 to 7:00pm in the Fellowship Hall beginning with Soup and Bread and study time following.



During his ministry on earth, Jesus said many things that challenged His listeners. In the book of John, there are seven times in which Jesus says "I am. . ." Each statement gives us a glimpse into God's character and what both God and Jesus are like. One important point: it's imperative to study these "I am" statements in their context so that we form an accurate understanding of what Jesus was really saying.

The second gathering on March 3rd will likely have taken place by the time you receive this newsletter. Soup and Bread will continue to be offered at 5:30pm on Sunday evenings March 10 and 17 with study and discussion following from 6-7pm.

PLAN NOW to be part of this moving and meaningful series. Our Christian Education and Worship Committees will coordinate the evening meals. Gather with us to dive into scripture to strengthen your journey in the Christian faith.

### **Lenten Worship**

As we travel together on our Lenten journey, we need to take time to reflect on where we are going and why. From the solemn reminder of our mortality on Ash Wednesday, we have moved to a deeper contemplation of God's great love for us, God's mercy, God's grace — all expressed through the life and death of Jesus.

Each Sunday morning we have the opportunity to meet together to praise, to meditate, to consider, to reflect, to hear God's Word to us and for us. Then Sunday evenings our Lenten Study has been delving into the "Great I Am's" of Jesus.

Yet as we draw closer to Holy Week, the most sacred time of our liturgical year, we need to acknowledge our frailty, our vulnerability, our utter dependence on God's love and grace. How can we participate more fully in Christ's redemptive act?

Thursday March 28, Maundy Thursday, we are invited and encouraged to gather at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary to worship, to reflect, to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion as we bear witness to Jesus' Great Commandment: Love one another.

Good Friday the church will be open from noon until 1:00 p.m. for us to drop in (or stay the whole hour) for a time of music and the Word. May our Lenten journey be one of renewal and rediscovery as together we recommit ourselves as disciples of Jesus.

#### **Easter Dawn Service**

With Easter being so early this year, our Easter Dawn Service will be held at 7:00 a.m., the time of sunrise, at Old Leacock. Come gather around the fire in the courtyard, light a candle, and sing "Alleluia! He Is Risen, He Is Risen Indeed!"
