Dear Members and Friends,

The book of Proverbs is one of the most practical books in the Old Testament. With its thought-provoking wisdom and memorable epigrams, the writings of King Solomon have provided inspiration and instruction to generations of God's followers looking to practice right living in every area of their life. Many of the principles touched on in Proverbs offer warning, correction, encouragement, and practical steps for good, honest, faithful living.

Vision is a necessary and relevant aspect of successful living. When corrected, mine is 20/20. Uncorrected it's 20/40 left eye; 20/60 right eye. It's called 'nuisance vision' because things are just fuzzy enough around the edges to keep me from seeing as clearly as I would want, and certainly at critical times.

### What is your vision? What is the vision of our church?

Yet relatively early in a new century, society, culture, and institutions of every kind including the church are trying to figure out how to move forward meaningfully and relevantly. During the pandemic and beyond, we have made many adjustments. While discovering ways to maintain vital connections, significant adaptations in medical care to the delivery of goods and services have occurred.

#### What are we seeing and what are we failing to see?

More than ever, the voice of scripture—and that of scholars, researchers, scientists, inventors, educators, philosophers, theologians, musicians and poets, laborers and leaders is needed.

Without that collaboration, and the vision shaped by these perspectives, people who are perishing will remain angry and afraid, abandoned, frustrated, struggling, confused, and without hope.

With LENT upon us, we have the opportunity to look ahead. . .to sharpen our focus. In renewing our efforts, we can gain a keener vision in the areas of membership, stewardship, and mission. We

can examine what motivates us to keep going. Is is our faith? Our loyalty or persistence? Our money and time? Is it all of these things and those things beyond our efforts which keep us inspired?

If through our teaching, preaching, worship and witness we have strengthened your vocation, life choices, and values. . . if our church has inspired daily acts of compassion and social justice in Jesus' name, then our vision remains focused and clear.

JOIN us weekly in worship, our Lenten Study—"The Bible in Song"—in times of fellowship, learning, and service to sharpen and uphold the vision we claim.
